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2	MS. ALVAREZ: Good evening, everyone.
3	For those joining us virtually, we have
4	2 ASL interpreters joining us today,
5	Ariel and Erika Agramonte. There are

10	Thank you.
11	CHAIR RICE: Good evening, my name
12	is Arva Rice, I use she/her pronouns.
13	And I am the interim chair of the
14	Civilian Complaint Review Board. I
15	would like to call the November's public
16	meeting to order.
17	I'd just like to start today by
18	introducing our new board member,
19	Patrick Smith. Mr. Smith has lived in
20	New York for decades with a wealth of
21	experience across journalism
22	communications and public policy and New
23	York City politics. He will bring a
24	valuable perspective to our work and I
25	look forward to working alongside him to

1 make the City safer for all people. 2 I would also like to congratulate 3 board members, Joe Fox and Kevin 4 5 Jemmott, on being appointed to the board. Thank you both for your service 6 7 and commitment to this city. I'm going 8 to ask the board members to --9 MR. MEYERS: Tell us who they are. 10 CHAIR RICE: Yes, I would have the board members to like the start to our 11 right with Joe Fox. 12 MR. FOX: Joe Fox, I'm the Police 13 14 Commissioner designee of the board - the 15 board member which I have been doing I believe since April and glad to be here 16 17 tonight. Thank you. 18 MS. SIMMONS: Esmeralda Simmons, I 19 am a Public Advocate designee from 20 Brooklyn, New York. 21 MR. MERRITT: I'm Herman Merritt, 22 City Council designee from Brooklyn. 23 MR. DWYER: Frank Dwyer, 24 Commissioner designee. 25 MR. SMITH: Pat Smith, mayoral

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2	appointee.
3	MR. SIEGEL: John Siegel, mayoral
4	appointee.
5	CHARLANE BROWN-WYANDS: Good
б	evening, Charlane Brown-Wyands, Police
7	Commissioner appointee.
8	CHAIR RICE: Terrific. And we are
9	also joined virtually. Joe would you
10	like to introduce yourself?
11	MR. PUMA: Good afternoon, everyone.
12	My name is Joseph Puma, I am the
13	Manhattan City Council's designee to the
14	board.
15	CHAIR RICE: We will be joined in a
16	few moments by Kevin Jemmott, who is
17	having traffic issues, but he will be
18	joining us in a few.
19	I'd like to ask are there any
20	changes or corrections to the board
21	minutes for the month of October? Any
22	changes or corrections to the minutes?
23	(No response.)
24	CHAIR RICE: Okay. Seeing that we
25	have none, I'm going to ask for a motion

1 2 to approve the October board meeting minutes? 3 BOARD MEMBER: Motion. 4 5 CHAIR RICE: All those in favor in approving the board minutes presented 6 7 say aye. 8 (Chorus of ayes). 9 CHAIR RICE: Opposed? 10 (No response.) 11 CHAIR RICE: The board minutes have 12 been approved. 13 Again, I want to congratulate our 14 Youth Advisory Council or the YAC on 15 their international summit that they 16 hosted a few weeks ago. The YAC is made 17 up of youngsters between the ages of 10 18 and 18 of age who reside all across the 19 five boroughs. This is the fifth YAC 20 Summit to highlight the new perspective 21 on policing. 22 This year was unique, however, 23 because it expanded to a worldwide 24 conversation. They had young 25 representatives from the UK, Mexico,

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2	Guatemala, Kenya, Nigeria and Zambia,
3	who shared their experiencing on
4	policing in their countries. They
5	discussed the shared and different
6	issues and brainstormed solutions. I
7	want to thank these young leaders for
8	sharing their perspectives in working to
9	improve their communities.
10	The applications for the 2024 YAC
11	are now open, and we encourage all
12	New Yorkers to apply. Visit the CCRB
13	website to learn more an to apply. We
14	will now hear from our executive
15	director, Jonathan Darche.
16	MR. DARCHE: Thank you, Madam Chair.
17	My name is Jon Darche, I use he/him
18	pronouns, I am the executive director of
19	the agency. This week I've been at the
20	annual conference of the National
21	Association for the Civilian Oversight
22	Law Enforcement in Chicago. So far the
23	trip has been extremely rewarding.
24	Similar to how New York City's police
25	oversight system has seen major changes

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2	in recent years, so has Chicago. One of
3	the most important features was
4	Chicago's complex police discipline
5	system is that civilians have final
6	disciplinary authority.
7	When the Chicago Office of Police
8	Accountability or COPA, finds misconduct
9	and recommends discipline, if the police
10	superintendent disagrees with that
11	discipline, a member of the all civilian
12	police board determines whether or not
13	to use the COPA recommendation or the
14	police disciplinary recommendation.
15	Which could either be lesser discipline
16	or no discipline at all.
17	Then, in cases where it has been
18	decided that a member of the Chicago
19	Police Department should be fired,
20	there's a full disciplinary hearing in
21	front of the nine-member police board.
22	Which the defense is allowed to cross
23	examine witnesses and present its own
24	evidence. In addition to allowing for a
25	final authority to be in civilian hands,

Chicago's oversight system shows that
radical transparency is possible. All
evidence gathered by COPA that doesn't
personally identify a civilian of
that doesn't personally identify a
member of the public is put on the COPA
website within 90 days of an incident;
911 calls, police communication as well
as video of all kinds, cell phone video,
surveillance video, and most importantly
body worn video.
In addition to COPA and the police

board, Chicago's oversight system has two other important civilian components; the Community Commission for Police Safety and Accountability, and the Deputy Inspector General for Public Safety. These groups have an important partner in the Chicago Police Department's Internal Affairs Bureau. These groups meet regularly to ensure there is, not only an effective oversight system for individual misconduct, but that patterns of

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misconduct are recognized.

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New York has a similarly complicated civilian oversight system. In the city, the CCRB has partners including the Inspector General for the New York City Police Department, the New York City Commission to Combat Police Corruption, and the Law Enforcement Misconduct of the New York State General's office. While at NACOLE, I liaise with folks from oversight entities from Albany, Schenectady, Rochester and Suffolk County, I pledge to work more closely with our partners in the City and upstate to develop ways to work together to improve our agency's capabilities. It is also interesting to discuss funding issues with leaders from oversight entities from around the

nation. Again, the COPA is an interesting entity to compare to the CCRB. Currently, the CCRB's budget is approximately \$244 million and COPA's annual budget is \$16 million. Yet, COPA

1 2 investigated 600 complaints this year. 3 And CCRB is going to try and fully investigate more than 2,400 complaints 4 5 in 2023. The CCRB's budget right now is approximately 50 percent larger than 6 7 COPA's, but we are going to endeavor to 8 investigate more than four times as many 9 complaints as COPA this year. 10 Unfortunately, the cuts announced by 11 the administration today make that 12 unlikely. The CCRB is currently facing 13 a 15 percent program to eliminate the gap and is under a hiring freeze. 14 This 15 is going to impact our ability to do the 16 work that this agency has been doing to 17 investigate, mediate and prosecute 18 complaints of police misconduct. It is 19 going to impact the strides this agency 20 has made in recent years. 21 The staff and I have been working on 22 finding ways the continue to provide the 23 services this City deserves and expects 24 even under extreme budgetary pressure 25 and to discuss these contingencies at

the December meeting.

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Before we continue with the 3 4 meetings, some updates on agency 5 operations: Our office is open for walk-in complaints, but it is also 6 7 possible to file a complaint online at 8 NYC dot GOV forward slash CCRB complaint or NYC dot GOV forward slash CCRB 9 10 C-O-M-P-L-A-I-N-T; by telephone by 11 calling 1-800-341-2272 or just dialling 12 311 and saying you would like to file a 13 complaint about a member of the NYPD. 14 Also, if anyone wishes to file a 15 complaint tonight, you have two 16 investigators on hand ready to take your complaints, Emma Stydahar and Rob Bryan. 17 We also have a member of our Civilian 18 19 Assistant Unit here, Amy O'Sullivan. 20 Please if you are online and would 21 like to make a comment, use the raise 22 your hand feature and whether you are 23 online or in person at 100 Church, 24 please keep your comments to four 25 minutes maximum. I would like to thank

1 the staff for their hard work and thank 2 again, the members of the public for 3 4 participating. 5 CHAIR RICE: Does anyone have any questions for your executive director? 6 7 (No response.) 8 CHAIR RICE: I have a quick one. Ιf 9 you could just restate; you said that 10 the Chicago entity that was responsible 11 for processing 600 cases last year. Could you tell me the budget size again? 12 13 MR. DARCHE: They are roughly 16 million. 14 15 CHAIR RICE: Okay. 16 All right, we have been joined by 17 Ken Jemmott, if you would introduce 18 yourself. 19 MR. JEMMOTT: Good evening, 20 everyone. My name is Kevin Jemmott, and 21 I'm the Queens appointee by the Mayor. 22 CHAIR RICE: If we do not have any 23 other questions, I'm going to ask for 24 our Director of Outreach, Mr. Jahi Rose, 25 if he would make his presentation today.

1 2 MR. ROSE: Thank you very much. My 3 name is Jahi Rose, I go by he/him I am the Director of Outreach 4 pronouns. 5 for the Civilian Complaint Review Board. I would just provide some brief overview 6 of what CCRB is, and some interesting 7 8 updates. So Civilian Complaint Review Board 9 10 is the nation's largest independent 11 oversight entity over the largest police force in the country. What CCRB 12 13 investigates, mediates and prosecutes complaints of misconduct against members 14 15 of the NYPD. The agency is governed by a 15-member board, many of which you met 16 on the board today. The seats are 17 18 appointed by the Mayor; five seats 19 appointed by the Mayor, five by the New 20 York City Council, three designated by 21 the Police Commissioner, one by the Public Advocate and the Chair is 22 23 generally appointed by the New York City 24 Council and the Mayor. CCRB 25 investigates allegations of misconduct

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1 2 -- a helpful is FADO force, abuse of authority, offensive language and 3 untruthful statements. 4 5 Just a couple of facts about the Right to Know Act. Right to Know Act is 6 a law that went into effect the 7 8 October 19th, 2018; this law impacts interactions with members of the New 9 10 York City Police Department. Under 11 certain circumstances officers should identify themselves by providing their 12 name and information, such as their 13 rank, command and shield number. With 14 15 some exceptions, the officer should 16 explain the purpose of the interaction. 17 They should inform them of their right 18 to say no when asking for consent to 19 search the person, property or vehicle 20 or an individual's home. Under certain 21 circumstances offer a business card 22 bearing the officer's name and 23 information, it also shows how to make a 24 comment and/or complaint about the interaction with that individual and the 25

1 2 officer. 3 Civilians can request the business cards in all encounters. This is what 4 5 the business card looks like. (Whereupon, the aforementioned 6 7 document was presented.) 8 MR. ROSE: It has also has information on the back indicates how 9 10 you can obtain body-worn camera footage, 11 in addition to information about Crime Stoppers and how to contact 12 13 counter-terrorism. 14 Remember, if you do see -- if you'd 15 like to file a complaint just this 16 mentioned by executive director, John 17 Darche, file a complaint by going to CCRB's website, NYC dot GOV forward 18 19 slash CCRB complaint. So call the 20 hotline at 1-800-341-CCRB or 21 1 - 800 - 341 - 2272. 22 Remember, if you see footage of 23 misconduct on social media, you can file 24 a complaint even if you wasn't there or 25 in person. CCRB handles on social media

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are CCRB under score NYC. Couple of other ways to file a complaint include calling 311, visiting CCRB at our headquarters at 100 Church Street in Lower Manhattan on the 10th floor. You can also direct message the Civilian Complaint Review Board on Facebook, Twitter, X and Instagram. As mentioned, the typical handle is at CCRB underscore NYC. You can send CCRB a letter to 100 Church Street, 10th floor, New York, New York 103007. You can also file a complaint at a

local precinct. It doesn't have to be the precinct where the interaction took place -- officers are required to take the complaint at the precinct. You can also file a complaint to the precinct. You can also request a CCRB complaint form and you can get a postage free for your envelope.

The CCRB conducted our Week of Awareness from October 23rd to Friday, October 27th. In recognition of our one

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2	year anniversary of our ability to be
3	able to investigate biased based
4	policing and racial profiling we also
5	partnered with 23 organizations during
6	that time; conducted 30 events, included
7	info sessions in various languages,
8	Chinese, French, Fulani, Wolof, and
9	Spanish. The CCRB also partnered with
10	elected officials, Assembly member
11	Khaleel Anderson, Assembly member
12	Monique Chandler-Waterman, Assembly
13	member Emily Gallagher, Assembly member
14	Stefani Zinerman and the Office of
15	Assembly member, Al Taylor.
16	If you would like to request an

23	CHAIR RICE: Does the board have any
24	questions for Mr. Rose?
25	(No response.)

1 2 CHAIR RICE: Thank you so much for 3 that presentation. It was a great work on the outreach week. 4 5 MR. ROSE: Thank you so much. CHAIR RICE: We will now enter the 6 7 public comment portion of the meeting. 8 We will begin with those who are joining 9 us virtually, who would like to make a 10 comment following those who are joining 11 us in person. Those who are joining us 12 virtually, we ask that you use the raise 13 your hand feature and ask that you 14 please keep your comments to four 15 minutes. 16 Yojaira, would you like to call on 17 the first person. 18 MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you, Madam 19 Chair. First, we'll be hearing from 20 Eric Dym. 21 MR. DYM: Thank you for giving me 22 the opportunity to speak here. My name 23 is Eric Dym, I'm a former lieutenant for 24 the NYPD and I'm retired. I've been 25 coined as the most complained cop,

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according to the city newspaper reflective of an overzealous targeted by the Civilian Complaint Review Board. Ι did intrusive police work my entire career as a SPEC lieutenant anti crime sergeant, and also an active police officer throughout New York City. The last part of my tenure, I was working the south Bronx for almost an entire decade where I was responsible for retrieving illegal firearms off the street, saving lives day in and day out. Now what I hear is constant push outreach from the Civilian Complaint Review Board to the community about how to make a complaint against a police officer, if you see alleged misconduct. Now what I never hear is about

mending a relationship with the community and the police officers to improve public safety. So I'd like to ask the Civilian Complaint Review Board is the Civilian Complaint Review Board willing to admit that the outreach that

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2	the Civilian Complaint Review Board
3	pushes to make complaints against police
4	officers. Let me circle back for a
5	second and say this: Police officers
б	are provided with a survey on a yearly
7	basis to improve public safety, improve
8	morale, improve things amongst the
9	police department.
10	One of the questions that is asked
11	of a police officer and rank and file is
12	the pressure of the Civilian Complaint
13	Review Board or the fear of a
14	substantiated complaint withholds your
15	ability to do intrusive or proactive
16	police work which means addressing
17	broken windows theory, or going out and
18	detaining potential persons of
19	interests, subjects based on people
20	versus the board which is a case of 1976
21	which is the right to search and
22	seizure. Which is mostly uncomfortable
23	for people, but it's necessary to do
24	intrusive police work. And the answer
25	is yes. That we see a phenomena that I

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1 2 foreshadowed over a year ago, that police officers would now be attacked 3 and assaulted on a constant basis. 4 And 5 we're seeing a lieutenant two days ago, recently, viciously attacked, beaten; 6 7 you can see his bloody face beaten. 8 The following day again, happened to 9 be in the same borough in the Bronx 10 where a police officer was again, 11 physically attacked on a subway. And I think it's matter of a time and it's 12 13 unfortunate that we lose a cop to the NYPD to the hands of another without a 14 15 firearm but from a physical 16 confrontation. 17 I ask the Civilian Complaint Review 18 Board, do you believe, are you willing 19 to admit that the pressure of a civilian 20 complaint is holding the police officers 21 back and their inability to do their 22 work to keep themselves safe, which 23 ultimately is reflective of the safety 24 of the residents of New York City. Now 25 I understand, I have been an advocate to

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2	fight for change of the Civilian
3	Complaint Review Board. I never say to
4	abolish the Civilian Complaint Review
5	Board. Why? Because I understand with
6	great power comes great responsibility.
7	And I used to teach my personnel, this
8	is one of the few jobs or few
9	employments in the entire world where
10	you can walk outside and say I'm going
11	to get a cup of coffee and you end up
12	with a gun powder and you have to take
13	someone's life for the better of the
14	city and to keep everyone safe. And
15	immediately after, still get that cup of
16	coffee.
17	Now, I don't mean to say that in a
18	cold way, but it's unfortunate, but it's
19	necessary. So yes, we should be
20	questioned by various bodies to show
21	accountability and responsibility. But
22	it must be fair and we all deserve due
23	process. So I just want to know if the
24	Civilian Complaint Review Board is

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willing to admit contribution in that

1 2 with the police officer when it comes to 3 public safety. Thank you everyone. I know my time 4 5 is up. Thank you for listening. I appreciate it. If you'd like to listen 6 7 to more, please listen at New York 8 Finest Retired Unfiltered podcast, I am the co-host at the Finest Unfiltered. 9 10 Thank you. 11 CHAIR RICE: Thank you so much Mr. 12 Dym for your comments. I'm going to let 13 our executive director respond to them 14 as well. I did want to say, as we will 15 know the role of the Civilian Complaint 16 Review Board is to be responsive to our 17 community members have negative 18 interaction with the police department. 19 As we go out for community 20 conversations, we are always asked to 21 make sure that folks know that we exist. 22 That's the role of the outreach team is 23 to let folks know that the Civilian 24 Complaint Review Board is here, and a resource for New Yorkers. That is all I 25

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1 2 am willing to take accountability for because that is in the scope of our 3 work. Jon, did you want to respond? 4 5 MR. DARCHE: If I added anything now, it could take away from what you 6 said. 7 8 CHAIR RICE: Yojaira, who is the 9 next person on the line? 10 MS. ALVAREZ: No other folks have 11 raised their hands to speak. We will move to the public, in-person session. 12 13 CHAIR RICE: For those of us who are 14 joining us in person, if you are 15 interested in making a public comment, 16 you can line up by the podium. And once 17 again, I ask to keep your comments to 18 four minutes or less. 19 MR. MEYERS: Good afternoon, I am 20 the President of the New York Civil 21 Rights Coalition. 22 I'm going to be a broken record 23 today. As I have been for the last six 24 or seven public meetings of the CCRB. Ι 25 am going to -- when I say public, I'm

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2	saying that, I keep saying the same
3	thing and nothing ever changes.
4	First I want to welcome again and
5	hope that eventually the chair becomes
6	chair. Tell me if the Mayor, he's so
7	busy that he can't appoint a chair
8	it's ridiculous it's ridiculous.
9	Honestly, if I had been in your chair, I
10	would be embarrassed. Maybe that's his
11	intent to embarrass the chair of the
12	CCRB to make sure that the public
13	that's understands he's doing the
14	time. They can't hear. I don't
15	understand why the chair is this on?
16	I don't understand why it's taking
17	so long to appoint a chair of this
18	panel. It is insulting to the chair to
19	the members of this board that don't
20	have a permanent chair. It's
21	ridiculous. Why has this Mayor
22	frivolous with his responsibility to
23	appoint people. He appoints, there are
24	designees from the city council and
25	other stuff, but he appoints everything

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2	to his committee and he appoints the
3	chair. So why is it taking so damn
4	long. Second commission to have a
5	meeting with you I come here every
6	looking for you every other meeting,
7	looking waiting to have a public session
8	with the CCRB. I want to know know what
9	he's got to say Is he different from
10	his predecessor with respect to the
11	CCRB Your decisions were respect
12	to him no no there's no difference
13	peas in the same pod both inept
14	and incompetent can't say that the
15	chair and every say that never
16	comes to the public sessions because he
17	doesn't want to get booed by of the
18	public I appreciate the members who
19	are here from the police department.
20	That's all I can say about that. I
21	appreciate your presence. But you
22	didn't have to get the Police
23	Commissioner to get on board with your
24	recommendations. Why is it routine now
25	for the Police Commissioner to ignore

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recommendations to downgrade -- by the way, I did file a complaint. I'm not going to say how many months ago. It's too damn long. The police officer, based on the video of a police officer who interfered people's rights at the Roosevelt Hotel. A complaint was made to the deputy Mayor, a complaint was made to the CCRB. You haven't investigated -- and nothing happened yet -- no appointed -- nothing -- what the hell is going on should take so long to investigate a complaint that's on videotape? A police officer interfering with civilian's lives. -- CCRB's and we still get tickets -- this is very --

And you want to have meetings and sessions with the youth and stuff like that. Tell me about what are you doing. Finally, let me say this: The roster of our sessions here. We have a close --23 roll -- not just who is present but who is doing what and saying what. Is anybody, are any of you replying on

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1 2 behalf of CCRB to your police commissioner. Has anybody demanded that 3 he come here and meet with the public 4 5 and public session and meeting with the CCRB -- why can't you talk to your own 6 7 police commissioner? He's the --8 representing the -- representatives --9 this is outrageous. This is an insult 10 to the public process to CCRB's agenda to the -- CCRB's. You just don't get 11 12 accountability. And the powers that be 13 -- and the police commissioner and why 14 do you put up with it -- one, two, 15 three, four, all of you. We get 16 nothing, we get crickets. 17 CHAIR RICE: Thank you, Mr. Meyers. 18 What I heard is the concern about the 19 continuing role as myself as an interim 20 chair; the request for the NYPD 21 Commissioner be part of a public session; concern about our concurrence 22 23 rate, the case that you still have out 24 cite pending, and also the role of all

the people that are here. Which is

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where I want to start, I want to let you all know, this is one thing that we do as numbers of the -- is having these public meetings on a monthly basis. But every one of these single spends hours and hours time reviewing cases. So every single of this board is active in the role and the work of the CCRB and takes that work very seriously. And I want to thank them publicly for the role they take here. There's not a single one of us who does not sit on a panel and multiple panels every month. So I want to thank them for their dedication to this work. I want to ask Jon if he wanted to respond to some of the other questions that were related to either the concurrence rate and also in regards to Mr. Meyers case specifically. MR. DARCHE: With regard to Mr. Meyer's case, it is pending a panel review. Soon as it's closed, which will certainly be before the end of this

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2	year, we will notify Mr. Meyers of what
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	happened in that investigation. We will
4	get right on it. With regard to the
5	concurrence rate is it is still very
6	early in this commissioner's term to
7	know if there is going to be a change in
8	how the current commissioner handles the
9	CCRB's cases compared to their
10	predecessors. What I can say is a
11	noticeable difference is the pace at
12	which the police commissioner is closing
13	cases. The police commissioner may have
14	already closed more cases than their
15	predecessors. But we'll have a more
16	detailed analysis of that data at that
17	end of year meeting in December.
18	CHAIR RICE: Thank you, Jon, for
19	that. In terms of the interim chair
20	role, Mr. Meyers, I will continue to
21	serve as long as the City of New York
22	will have me.
23	Is there anyone else who has a
24	public comment, if they would like to
25	come to the podium?

1 2 PERSON: (Inaudible). CHAIR RICE: We have not made that 3 request. We're going to meet with the 4 5 police commissioner first. I'll let you know how that goes. 6 7 Any other comments from the public? 8 (No response.) 9 CHAIR RICE: Okay, no response. 10 Do you have any old business to come 11 before the board? Any Old business. 12 (No response.) 13 CHAIR RICE: Do we have any new 14 business to come before the board. 15 (No response). CHAIR RICE: All right.
