NOTICE OF ADOPTION
TO AMEND ARTICLE 11 OF THE NEW YORK CITY HEALTH CODE

In compliance with §1043(b) of the New York City Charter (the “Charter”) and pursuant to the authority granted to the Board of Health by §558 of said Charter, the Notice of Intention was published in the City Record on March 13, 2007. A public hearing was held on April 20, 2007. No one testified and the Department received no written comments. The Board of Health at its June 14, 2007 meeting adopted the following resolution.

STATUTORY AUTHORITY

This amendment to the New York City Health Code (“Health Code”) is promulgated pursuant to Sections 556, 558 and 1043 of the New York City Charter (“Charter”). Section 556 of the Charter grants the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (“Department”) jurisdiction to regulate matters affecting health in the City of New York. Specifically, Section 556(c)(2) of the Charter authorizes the Department to supervise the reporting and control of communicable and chronic diseases. Section 558(b) and (c) of the Charter empower the Board of Health to amend the Health Code and to include in the Health Code all matters to which the Department’s authority extends. Section 1043 of the Charter grants rule-making powers to the Department.

STATEMENT OF BASIS AND PURPOSE

The New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (Department) is amending Section 11.03 (a) of the New York City Health Code (Health Code) to remove “urethritis, non-gonococcal” (commonly referred to as “NGU”) from the list of reportable diseases/conditions because there is no longer a public health value in having this reported to the Department.

NGU was made a reportable disease/condition with the intent that it serve as a surrogate measure of *Chlamydia trachomatis* infection in the male population. At the time NGU was made reportable, there were very limited diagnostic tests for *Chlamydia trachomatis*, and men were not routinely tested or screened for that infection. There are now highly sensitive and specific tests for *Chlamydia trachomatis* which may be performed on male urethral and urine specimens, and males are being tested and screened for this infection with increasing frequency, and reported to the Department. For this reason, reports of NGU are no longer likely to represent *Chlamydia trachomatis* infection, and in any event, monitoring reports of laboratory-confirmed *Chlamydia trachomatis* infection is the best means of measuring the burden of that disease in the population. Therefore, the Department hereby amends §11.03 of the Health Code by removing NGU from the list of reportable diseases/conditions.

The rule amendment is as follows:

RESOLVED, that subdivision (a) of Section 11.03 of Article 11 of the New York City Health Code, as set forth in Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York, as last amended by resolution on

June 15, 2006, be and the same hereby is amended, to be printed together with explanatory notes, by deleting the entry for “Urethritis, non-gonococcal”, as follows:

§11.03 . Diseases and conditions reportable.

(a) Cases and carriers affected with any of the following diseases and conditions, and persons who at the time of their death were apparently so affected, shall be reported to the Department:

Tularemia

Typhoid fever

[Urethritis, non-gonococcal]

Vaccinia disease, defined as:

(1) Persons with vaccinia infection due to contact transmission; and,

(2) Persons with the following complications from vaccination: eczema vaccinatum, erythema multiforme major or Stevens-Johnson syndrome, fetal vaccinia, generalized vaccinia, inadvertent inoculation, myocarditis or pericarditis, ocular vaccinia, post-vaccinial encephalitis or encephalomyelitis, progressive vaccinia, pyogenic infection of the vaccination site, and any other serious adverse events (i.e., those resulting in hospitalization, permanent disability, life-threatening illness or death).

Notes: The Department removed “urethritis, non-gonococcal” from the list of reportable diseases/conditions on June 14, 2007, because there is no longer a public health value in having this reported to the Department.
