Good news! Your district, Queens 11, has been selected for a one-time only curbside clothing collection by the Department of Sanitation.

Each year, New York City residents throw away over 200,000 tons of clothing and textiles. To make it easier to reuse or recycle unwanted clothing, DSNY is testing curbside collection of clothing.

On your recycling day during the week of October 19, you can set out unwanted clothing for DSNY pickup.

HOW TO SET OUT CLOTHING FOR DSNY COLLECTION

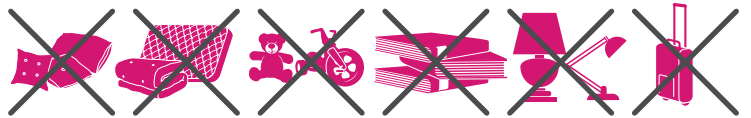
1. Fill the two enclosed pink bags with clean, unwanted clothing. Securely tie the bags and place them at the curb anytime after 4pm the night before your recycling day.
2. Fill the pink bags with clean, unwanted clothing, shoes, handbags, belts, towels, linens, and curtains. It's OK to include ripped or torn items because these will be recycled. Please do not include books, rugs, suitcases, lamps, or children's toys.
3. If you need additional bags, please download and print labels to tape to clear plastic bags to designate them for textile recycling. You may also be able to contact your local Community Board for extra pink bags for the pilot (go to nyc.gov/cau and click on Find Your Community Board). ACCEPTED:



clothing • shoes (pairs only) • accessories •
handbags, wallets & computer cases •
gently-used linens & bedding •
gently-used towels & curtains • clean rags

NOT ACCEPTED:



pillows • mattresses or futons •
toys or stuffed animals • books • lamps •
suitcases • rugs

WHAT HAPPENS TO DONATED ITEMS

DSNY will bring all collected clothing to Goodwill. Your donations will help support their mission to empower individuals with disabilities and other barriers to employment to gain independence through the power of work.
