


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INTRODUCTION

These *Statements of Community District Needs*, prepared by New York City's community boards, provide a context for development and assessment of their budget priorities. Pursuant to Sections 230 and 231 of the City Charter, community boards submit annual expense and capital budget priorities which must be considered by city agencies in the preparation of their departmental budget estimates.

Material preceding each statement, supplied by the Department of City Planning, summarizes district demographic and land use characteristics. The district profiles include:

- o Population counts from the 1980, 1990, and 2000 censuses. 2008 population estimates are listed for the City and borough totals based on Department of City Planning estimates as adopted by the Census Bureau in July 2008. - o Resident births and deaths within New York City, 2000 and 2007, from data prepared by the New York City Department of Health;
- o 2005 and 2009 income support levels -- Public Assistance, Supplemental Security Income and Medicaid-Only (excluding nursing home cases) -- provided by the New York City Human Resources Administration from their Medicaid Eligibility File;
- o Total land area from the Department of City Planning's 2007 LION street and District base map files; and
- o Land use in 2009, from the city's Real Property File providing the number of tax lots, lot area and percentage of total lot area in each land use category.¹ Lot area is in thousands of square feet and excludes lots with missing dimensions. Lots with certain classifications, such as land under water, are categorized as "Miscellaneous". The land uses of joint interest areas, which are not part of any community district, are assigned to appropriate categories in the borough and citywide profiles. For example, Central Park is counted as "Open Space Recreation" in the Manhattan and New York City profiles. City and borough land use totals may therefore exceed the sum of the community districts.

This edition of *Community District Needs* features listings of parklands and other publicly accessible open spaces. Based on 2009 data, maps of each community district show the location of parks and other public open spaces on both private and public properties. The maps are keyed to lists of the parks and open spaces with addresses, regulatory authorities and size.

Also featured this year are population estimates and other selected characteristics from the American Community Survey based on 55 Public Use Microdata areas (PUMAs) that approximate NYC community districts but are not coterminous with them. The American Community Survey is a Census Bureau nationwide survey designed to provide annual updates for geographic areas. Based on 2006 – 2008 three year population estimates, listings for each community district (and PUMA areas) feature updated estimates for native and foreign born residents, employment status for population 16 and over, median household income, and poverty level indicators. ¹Condominiums, which have separate tax lots for each unit, are aggregated to a single tax lot per block. Only one address per condominium complex (structures under the same condominium association) is counted.

This edition continues to include borough maps of City Council districts and computer-generated base maps of community districts. The base maps are available on the Department's website. Summary 2000 census data are provided. Each district profile also contains a listing of line-item projects funded in the Fiscal Year 2010 Capital Budget. The Department hopes that these statements will prove useful to communities and agencies planning for future programs and services. We welcome suggestions for the next edition of Community District Needs.







Public Use Microdata Area (PUMA) and Community District Equivalencies Staten Island, New York




Staten Island Community District 1 (Part 1) Parklands and Selected Publicly Accessible Open Spaces



Statement of Community District Needs Fiscal Year 2011

Community Board 1 represents Staten Island's North Shore neighborhoods and our needs focus on health, waterfront and economic development; improving the transportation infrastructure, including the expansion of mass transit; enhancing services for our youngsters and our senior citizens; and, providing recreational opportunities in underserved areas.

HEALTH

1. Assigning 6% of HHC's capital budget to the SIUH and RUMC medical systems;
2. Securing the funding necessary to move to electronic record keeping in our hospitals and clinics; and,
3. Creating urgent care centers in Rosebank and New Brighton.

WATERFRONT

1. Completing the North Shore Esplanade / Greenway trail connecting Fort Wadsworth to Snug Harbor; assigning title to DPR;
2. Swapping the NYC EDC Right of Way with comparable property owned by Atlantic Salt adjacent to the base of Richmond Terrace;
3. Setting a timeline for completion of the Lighthouse Museum Property; and,
4. Pursuing maritime related industries (such as ship line manufacturing) to locate along the industrial waterfront.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

1. Transferring the title of the old SIUH on Castleton Avenue to NYC EDC so it could be developed as a mixed use property.
2. Improving the street scape of Targee Street from Vanderbilt Avenue to Sobel Court through a Small Business Services program;
3. Increasing the funding available to Northfield, West New Brighton, Downtown Council and fund the Victory Boulevard B.I.D;
4. Increasing the residential component within the Homeport master plan; and,

5. Hastening the completion of the commercial component of the St. George Ferry Terminal and aggressively marketing the space.

TRANSPORTATION

1. Building a fourth bus depot to add to the fleet;
2. Constructing the landfill roads to NYC DOT specifications;
3. Reopening the IRT Number 5 station at the South Ferry;
4. Constructing signalized left-turn lanes;
5. Constructing continuous service roads along the SIE; and,
6. Developing the North Shore Railway / busway.

SOCIAL / EDUCATIONAL

1. Building or renting additional school space including a West Shore High School;
2. Increasing DYCD funding, including Youth Coordinator salaries;
3. Increasing funding to elder abuse prevention programs;
4. Developing additional senior housing;
5. Providing full access to technology in every school; and,
6. Building a Rosebank library.

RECREATIONAL

1. Developing Eibs Pond Park;
2. Securing state and federal brownfield money to clean then develop the Field of Dreams and the Blissenbach Marina; and,
3. Developing the property at Richmond Terrace and Van Name Avenue as a waterfront park.

PUBLIC SAFETY

1. Restoring the funding for the new 120 Precinct;
2. Hiring new police officers for the new 121 Precinct; and,
3. Assigning additional Parks Enforcement Patrol Officers to our parks.

CB1 believes these needs are prudent and fair.





BOROUGH OF STATEN ISLAND
DISTRICT NEEDS STATEMENT
FISCAL YEAR 2011

Our district is approximately 24 square miles in area encompassing the entire mid-island section of Staten Island. It is comprised of many small towns such as Arrochar, Bloomfield, Bulls Head, Chelsea, Dongan Hills, Emerson Hill, Grant City, Grasmere, Heartland Village, Lighthouse Hill, Manor Heights, Midland Beach, New Dorp, New Springville, Old Town, Richmondtown, South Beach, Travis, and Willowbrook. Each town has unique qualities and individual characteristics that residents strive to maintain and are very proud of.

The boundaries are from Staten Island Expressway from Verrazano Narrows Bridge south along the narrows to New York Harbor (which include Hoffman and Swinburne Islands) to Ebbitts Street west to Jason Street. Tysens Lane to Amboy Road, Richmond Road to St. Patricks Place to Clarke Avenue across Arthur Kill Road, to eastern boundary to LaTourette Park, and southern and eastern boundary to Richmondtown Restoration to southern boundary of LaTourette Park, to West Shore Expressway, half mile north on Expressway to Fresh Kills Creek including Prall's Island to Arthur Kill.

Community Board 2 is one of the city's last growth areas. The district area consists of single and two family homes, townhouses, duplexes, three city housing projects, several six-story apartment complexes, co-ops and garden apartments.

Our District's foremost needs are as follows:

Department of Transportation:

Traffic congestion is the Community Board's number one concern. Many of Staten Island's major arterials are two lane country roads, that is, one lane in each direction.

Some of the one lane roads such as Rockland Avenue and Forest Hill Road desperately need to be reconstructed to enable improved traffic to flow (HW986B & HW986C).

The capital project for the widening of Rockland Avenue (HWR1160) is a crucial cross island transportation need and has been lingering much too long over a stalled EIS process and issues, and needs to move forward.

The safety and security of drivers and pedestrians are of utmost concern, which is why we must focus on improving traffic controls.

DOT must seek ways to make some of our District's busy intersections safer (Victory Boulevard and Richmond Avenue, New Dorp Lane and Hylan Boulevard, Clove Road and Hylan Boulevard).

The median on Victory Boulevard between Willow Road East and Canterbury Avenue needs to be extended to alleviate traffic backup from vehicles entering the College of Staten Island.

The board would like to see more innovative and coordinated traffic signals put to use.

Another way to help alleviate traffic congestion during rush hour would be using high speed ferries along the waterfront.

Since Fiscal Year 1986, we have requested an extension of Father Capodanno Boulevard thru Miller Field from Midland Beach to at least Bay Terrace. This should alleviate traffic along Hylan Boulevard especially in the Midland Beach / New Dorp area.

In the past, we have recommended that a new interchange be built off the West Shore Expressway south of the Fresh Kills waterway as the connection to the landfill roadways. The roadways can connect at various locations along Richmond Avenue and make a connection at Arthur Kill Road at the closed 2/8 section of the landfill. The use of these roads, which were built to Federal Guidelines, would greatly help to alleviate traffic congestion along the West Shore Expressway, Richmond Avenue, Victory Boulevard, Travis Avenue and Arthur Kill Road.

DOT needs to do a survey of the bus stops in our district and begin to address those that lack adequate space for MTA customers to stand. There are several bus stops on Victory Boulevard between the West Shore Expressway and Richmond Avenue where our constituents are forced to stand in a travel lane.

Community Board 2 would like the DOT to begin opening the existing roads in the Fresh Kills Landfill. These roads, when opened will connect the mid-island to the South Shore in just minutes saving thousands of commuter miles, relieve congestion, and decrease air pollution. The board fully supports Borough President James P. Molinaro's plan.

Department of Environmental Protection:

Community Board Two is desperately in need of the installation of storm sewers in flood-prone areas and sanitary sewers in areas that have failing septic systems (HW1146).

The Board's top budget request from DEP has been designing storm sewers on Midland Avenue from Hylan Boulevard to Father Capodanno Boulevard. In order to alleviate some of the flooding conditions DEP has begun installation of dry wells and or seepage basins at problem intersections. We need additional seepage basins to be installed.

A top budget request to alleviate flooding conditions has been to create Bluebelts in all natural waterways. The Community Board is looking forward to the creation of Bluebelts in Midland Beach and South Beach. We need the DEP to aggressively continue acquiring properties for the Mid-Island Bluebelts.

The Board would like the Department of Environmental Protection to move forward with our sewer projects such as SE-740B. The sewer outlet project in Rockland Avenue, coupled with the Rockland Avenue DOT project (HW1160) have been lingering much too long. The EIS and designs for both the sewer and highway projects need to be brought to completion so that construction can commence.

The Community Board would like additional money in the budget for personnel to do culvert and catch basin cleaning to alleviate flooding conditions that occur where the basins and the culverts are clogged especially in the fall when leaves clog the top of catch basins. The Board would also like to see the continued funding for our SE-200 jobs.

Department of Parks and Recreation:

It is essential to increase Parks' personnel and funds for maintenance and supplies for the capital improvements to our district's parks. Also, more money is needed to be placed into the stump removal program. Once again we must say that the Parks Department has been extremely responsive to the community needs and has done a great job with so little resources.

The Board continues to support the Greenbelt Master Plan. In fact, one of our capital budget priorities is for the construction of an indoor swimming pool in the Greenbelt Recreation Center.

Construction of a pedestrian crossing at LaTourette Park across Richmond Hill Road continues to be an important priority to the Board. We are extremely concerned about the safety of the golfers and pedestrians that cross Richmond Hill Road by foot or car to get to the LaTourette Golf Course (city owned) and/or driving range.

The Board continues to support the Greenbelt Master Plan. In fact, a capital priority request is for the construction of an indoor swimming pool in the Greenbelt Recreation Center.

Police Department:

The Board is very satisfied with the job the Police Department is doing on Staten Island and at the 122nd Precinct, but of course we need more attention. Additional Traffic Enforcement Agents should be hired to help move traffic at busy intersections and at accidents, and prevent double and triple parking in front of schools, and address aggressive drivers on our roadways. Also the idling of engines and use of non-route streets by buses and commercial vehicles must also be addressed.

Fire Department:

Community Board Two is very pleased with the services provided by our firefighters. We would like the FDNY to be given the opportunity to enhance its operational capacity to respond to fires, pre-hospital care emergencies, building collapses and hazardous materials incidents, as well as natural disasters, terrorist acts and other emergencies.

Department of Sanitation:

Staten Island District 2 needs more litter baskets to be placed at bus stops. It is imperative that our streets be kept litter free.

Additional Funds to hire Sanitation Enforcement Police is needed for the "Illegal Dumping Task Force" to protect Staten Island's open spaces, wetlands, empty lots and parks.

We need the "Self-Help Disposal Site" to be reopened to accept bulk material such as appliances, furniture, garden cuttings, pruning cuttings, and any other household material.

Department of Youth and Community Development:

Additional funding for recreation and prevention programs for the youth on Staten Island is needed. It has been documented that for every dollar we spend in prevention we save dollars in other social services or criminal justice program.

Department of Health and Mental Hygiene:

The Community Board hopes that the Health Department continues to spray for mosquitoes even when the West Nile Virus is no longer a threat.

The Board would like the Health Department to cyclically bait continuous complaint areas for the Rodent Control Program. These are areas that always need baiting because of continuous rodent problems. It would be much simpler to have these areas baited on a regular schedule instead of waiting for complaints to come in.

Health and Hospital Corporation:


As you know, Sea View Hospital Rehabilitation Center and Home, a city hospital on Staten Island is a long term care facility.

The board continues to support Sea View's development plan for various types of housing for seniors.




Staten Island Community District 3 (Part 1)


Staten Island Community District 3 (Part 1) Parklands and Selected Publicly Accessible Open Spaces







STATEMENT OF COMMUNITY DISTRICT NEEDS FY 2011

As per Mayor Bloomberg's PLANYC report the population growth in Community Board 3 will continue and will reach a peak by 2030. As residents stay longer and settle, the population will age dramatically. In 1970, Staten Island was the City's youngest borough; by 2030 it will be the oldest. The elderly population on Staten Island is expected to double with a median age of 40 years by 2030. Also, reports show that most of the new residents that moved to the south shore of Staten Island were immigrants from other countries.

As our population grows the needs of our communities continue to grow for more public services and capital improvements. Our infrastructure system is already inadequate, and improvements are justifiably past due. Community Board 3 is one of the highest taxed districts in New York City. We should get our fair share of services on the south shore.

The following are Community Board 3's recommendations and priorities for FY2011:

Department of Transportation

CAPITAL

Traffic and transportation is the most important and serious issue to the residents in our district. We need improvements to help solve the traffic congestion throughout the south shore and Staten Island.

Reconstruction of Arthur Kill Road

Arthur Kill Road is a major arterial in our district. It is a narrow, two-lane street on the west side of our district. It runs through manufacturing, commercial and residential areas, so the traffic on Arthur Kill Road is very high in volume. Department of Transportation (DOT) and Department of Design and Construction (DDC) must expedite this project and immediately start the acquisition process. The first phase of reconstruction should start at Richmond Avenue to Clarke Avenue along the Brookfield Landfill property. Construction is scheduled for FY 2009. DOT must expedite this job NOW!

Reconstruction of Bloomingdale Road

DOT has this project proposed for reconstruction from Arthur Kill Road to Amboy Road. For 25 years we have asked DOT to start this job. Now this project is not scheduled for years to come. Community Board 3 is requesting that a small portion of Bloomingdale Road, between Amboy Road and South Service/Drumgoole Road East be separated from the larger project. This is a primary road in a very busy, growing community.

The DOT and DDC should expedite the smaller section of Bloomingdale Road and immediately start the acquisition process.

Reconstruction of Tennyson Drive

The section of roadway between Cleveland Avenue and Wiman Avenue needs to be open to traffic. A portion will be put in by a developer in the area. However, the City is responsible to construct the part of Tennyson Drive along the waterfront of Great Kills. It would help alleviate some of the congestion on Hylan Boulevard.

Nelson Avenue and Hylan Boulevard

Improvements have to be made at the corner of Nelson Avenue and Hylan Boulevard in Great Kills. It is one of the busiest intersections on Staten Island and the site of many accidents.

Reconstruction of Woodrow Road

Again, this is another project Community Board 3 has requested for more than 25 years. This is a major roadway that crosses through many towns and residential neighborhoods. DOT must expedite this project.

Fresh Kills Park Street system

Before any plans are finalized for this park, the roads have to be planned on this site. We support the Borough President and Community Boards #1 and #2 request for two (2) lanes in each direction from Richmond Avenue to the West Shore Expressway. DOT should start mapping this road as soon as possible. Park streets to the various sections of this park can be secondary roads but, we must have two (2) lanes in each direction for the main roadway.

Reconstruction of Huguenot Avenue

Huguenot Avenue runs from the Raritan Bay to Arthur Kill Road and the West Shore Expressway. A major arterial on the south shore, it passes through the town of Huguenot, connects to the Korean War Veterans Parkway, Staten Island Railway and goes past 3 schools, churches and residential communities. A small portion needs to be reconstructed. Huguenot Avenue between Rathbun Avenue and Drumgoole Road West must be reconstructed with curbs and sidewalks.

Park and Ride at Staten Island Railway

Park and Ride lots are needed at the Princes Bay, Pleasant Plains, Richmond Valley and Tottenville Staten Island Railway. Commuters need a site to park their cars without impacting on the local residents and businesses. DOT has to identify and work with SIR to acquire Park and Ride sites.

Sidewalks

The need for sidewalks in our area is a priority of Community Board 3. There are several locations where the DOT must install sidewalks. The following are city-owned locations in need of sidewalks:

- Arden Avenue on the unbuilt section of Rensselaer Avenue (between 586 and 590 Arden Avenue)
- Hylan Boulevard between Page Avenue and Bedell Avenue, adjacent to the South Shore Little League fields
- Bloomingdale Road between Ramona Avenue and Drumgoole Road West
- Drumgoole Road West between Maguire Avenue and Bloomingdale Road
- Kingdom Avenue behind PS 5 between Hylan Boulevard and Eylandt Street

Many of our streets have jut-outs, no sidewalks or curbs and are very narrow. Unfortunately, that is because DOT and Building Department granted street waivers over the past years. One reason for this is because the streets are not final mapped. We must allocate funds to final map our streets so they can be properly maintained and corrected where a jut-out problem exists. Also, DOT should start acquiring the areas where jut-outs create a traffic problem on our main streets.

The intersection of Arthur Kill Road and Arden Avenue has to be improved. Studies by State DOT report 53 accidents during the last two years at this site. The State DOT is looking at this problem area. However, we cannot wait ten or more years before something is done. New York City DOT should expedite a project under H.E.E.P. to correct this very busy intersection.

EXPENSE

Many of our streets are in disrepair with potholes. The DOT should allocate funding for additional pothole crews. We also need more traffic enforcement. One of our biggest complaints is regarding speeders and cars illegally parked, especially near schools. Enforcement should be present at arrival and dismissal time.

Department of Environmental Protection

CAPITAL

The most successful program ever initiated in the Community Board 3 District is the Bluebelt Program. The DEP and the Bluebelt staff have done an outstanding job developing and maintaining our valuable streams and culverts. The money that the City has saved by not having to install storm sewers, more than justifies the expansion of the Bluebelt Program. We at Community Board #3 feel so strongly about the Bluebelt Program that we continue to ask for funding for this program for additional manpower and staff. Also for equipment needed for maintenance and vehicles.

The Oakwood Creek should be incorporated as part of a Bluebelt project. The Oakwood community needs these wetlands protected and maintained to prevent flooding in the area. At the same time, DOT should open Medina Street and Tarrytown Avenue over the culvert to connect to Guyon Avenue.

DEP should start planning for a pump station and sanitary sewers in the Charleston area. DOT should work on getting title to many of the streets in Charleston. Also, the acquisition process should start. There are many new developments under construction and proposed in this area. It is important that sewers are installed in Charleston.

There are still many areas on the south shore without storm and sanitary sewers. Funding is needed to expedite these projects:

Department of Education

CAPITAL

Schools are a top priority of Community Board #3. There are sixteen (16) acres of city-owned property land banked on the south shore Charleston site for an educational complex. The rapidly growing population on the south shore of Staten Island calls for schools in all levels; elementary, intermediate and high schools.

New York Public Library

CAPITAL

Rossville Library

Our request for a Regional Library in Rossville is a top priority in our Capital Budget. The Rossville/Woodrow area consists of several large and small scale housing developments. There is a complete lack of library service in this area. A site has been identified for the regional library that is only a few blocks away from PS 56. The site is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Education. However, the need for a library is overwhelming. Everyone, including children and senior citizens would have easy access to this proposed library site. The libraries also play a strong role in education. It is important that funding for libraries and a new facility in Rossville, be allocated to the south shore.

Huguenot Library

The NY Public Library should immediately secure the city-owned site at Kingdom Avenue and Eylandt Street for a future Huguenot Library. The present location is inadequate for the needs of the community.

Department of Parks and Recreation

CAPITAL

Fairview Park

This park was promised to the community years ago and was supposed to be built before Bricktown was completed. We are still waiting for the Parks Department to build this park with ball fields, soccer fields, tennis courts, playgrounds, etc.

Fallen Hero Park

We are very anxious to have this park developed. It is sited in the middle of a residential community and would be an ideal park for all the young families in the area. The property is under the jurisdiction of the DEP. We are waiting for DEP to do a survey to split the property for the Parks Department to use as an active neighborhood park.

Kingdom Avenue

We are still waiting for the Parks Department to develop a plan for this site. Community Board 3 recommends tennis courts and a playground. This is located behind a public elementary school and surrounded by new homes. This is also an ideal site for young families to enjoy.

Great Kills Seaside Nature Park and Pier

The Parks Department must develop the twenty (20) acres of waterfront property in Great Kills. A portion at Nelson Avenue is developed with flower gardens and paths. The larger portion still needs

to be developed including the pier. We are waiting for the Parks Department to finish this project.

Fresh Kills Landfill

Community Board 3 strongly recommends that the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation acquire over 2,000 acres of the Fresh Kills Landfill for parkland. The site is appropriate for future recreational uses, i.e. golf, motorcross, trails, ball fields, boating and, especially, a golf course.

Arden Woods Park

A playground around the perimeter of the park would be a wonderful addition and greatly used by thousands of young families living around this park.

Wolfes Pond Park

The Parks Department and DOT should look into another access into the park. Many outdoor events take place at Wolfes Pond Park. An additional route in and out of the park would be very helpful and good to have in the event of an emergency.

Comfort Stations

We are developing our parks and attracting many people from throughout Staten Island, New Jersey and other boroughs. However, there is a serious lack of bathroom facilities in our parks. This creates an unacceptable and unhealthy condition in our parks and playgrounds. Funds must be allocated and construction expedited to provide comfort stations at Wolfes Pond Park, Lemon Creek, the fishing pier at Sharrotts Avenue, Conference House Park and other park locations where people congregate.

Indoor Pool

Residents on the south shore have expressed an interest in a public indoor pool in our community. We recommend a site at the corner of Eylandt Street and Luten Avenue which is part of Wolfes Pond Park. Tottenville High School is directly across the street from this site. We request funding for a study and design for an indoor pool in Huguenot. The Councilman has allocated funds to initiate a study.

Sidewalks along Park Land

The Parks Department should coordinate with DOT to have sidewalks installed at various areas along their properties, i.e. Arden Avenue between Arthur Kill Road and Correll Avenue, the Arden Woods Park.

Playground Equipment

Mayor Bloomberg's PKNY2030 report recommends all New Yorkers live within a 10 minute walk to a park. We have many undeveloped parkland areas, especially along the West side of Staten Island. We ask that playground equipment be installed at:

- Arden Woods Park at Arthur Kill Road next to Aspen Knoll development
- Arden Avenue between Forest Green and Dover Green
- Carlton Boulevard at Crown Avenue
- Carlton Boulevard at Drumgoole Road West

South Shore Beaches

The beaches on the south shore of Staten Island need to be cleaned. We spend millions of dollars

improving Conference House Park, Lemon Creek Park and Wolfes Pond Park, yet the waterfront is terribly neglected. We recommend the Parks Department purchase a Barber Surf Rake to filter and remove debris from the sand. Also a Cherrington Model 5000 model self-contained beach cleaner. People want to enjoy the waterfront – walking, playing and just sitting on the beach.

EXPENSE

Personnel

The Parks Department needs more personnel for pruning and climbers. Also, vehicles are needed to help maintain our parks.

Department of Sanitation

CAPITAL

With all the new housing developments and new streets opening up it is almost impossible for the district to service this large area. The Department of Sanitation (DOS) has projected a 33% increase in tonnage within the next decade in Community Board #3. This increased demand will require additional collection trucks and sanitation workers. It will also require another garage on the south shore of Staten Island. Community Board #3's recommendation is to site the garage on the southern most portion of the Fresh Kills Landfill on DOS property. We strongly disagree with siting a garage near any residential community.

The Household Self Help Facility dump site at the Fresh Kills Landfill should be open to the public. DOS should allocate funding for manpower at the household dump site. Also, more enforcement personnel are needed to help prevent illegal dumping.

“Pick up After Dog” signs should be made available again. Many of our complaints deal with neighbors not picking up after dogs. This is one of our biggest complaints received at the Board office.

Fire Department

Firehouse Renovations

Many firehouses are turn-of-the-last century buildings that need upgrades such as new roofs, apparatus floor replacements, waterproofing, pointing, electrical upgrades, as well as new kitchens and bathrooms. The City needs to fund these upgrades.

Fire Safety Education Outreach

Funding is requested to purchase smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors for distribution to the public throughout the year in all five boroughs. This budget allocation would cover the cost of 10,000 smoke detectors and 10,000 carbon monoxide detectors.

Police Department

CAPITAL

Staten Island, being the fastest growing district in New York State, needs a fourth precinct. We ask the Police Department to expedite this request. We believe our growth and development more than justifies another precinct. The fourth precinct should also house the Borough Command in case of displacement from the Homeport.

A Highway Emergency Patrol should be constructed on Staten Island. Along the West Shore Expressway, Korean War Veteran's and Martin Luther King Parkways. The large geographic size of Staten Island and the volume of traffic on our highways justify this facility. Each year, over 16 million vehicles cross over the Outerbridge alone. Motorists use our highways as a corridor to other boroughs, Long Island and northeastern states. We need to select a site and construct a Highway Emergency Patrol as soon as possible.

The 122nd Precinct has the largest geographic area to cover in New York City. The precinct building is overcrowded and needs to be improved. Funding should be allocated for the cleanup and renovation of the 122nd Precinct basement. Additional parking is also needed for the precinct.

EXPENSE

Due to our large geographic area the Staten Island precincts must cover, their vehicles are on the road 24/7 clocking hundreds of thousands of miles. The life span of a police vehicle on Staten Island is much shorter than other boroughs. We ask for additional police marked vehicles and vans for our precincts on Staten Island.

We need more police officers assigned to the 122 and 123 Precincts. The number of officers at these precincts has remained just about the same for the last 30 years. Yet our population has grown tremendously in those 30 years. We need the additional officers immediately.

Our Police officers need 2 wheel motor bikes and quads to cover our rural areas and open spaces. The scooters are needed around schools and commercial districts.

Civilian cleaners are needed on Staten Island to clean and maintain our precincts.

Police Officers should be assigned to every Staten Island ferryboat and around our train stations to provide a safe environment for our students, commuters, visitors, etc. More school crossing guards are needed around our schools. All the vacancies should be filled.

Special Traffic Enforcement Agents should be assigned to control traffic during rush hours and help keep traffic moving, especially around schools.

The NYC Police Department should receive their fair share of funding from Homeland Security.

Department of Aging

CAPITAL

Along with the rapid growth of the population on the south shore, the senior citizen population is the fastest growing segment in this district. There is truly a need for senior citizen housing on the south shore. The senior citizen community requests a site for senior citizen housing where they can still remain on Staten Island near their family and friends. As per PLANY 2030, Staten Island will be the oldest borough in New York City with the median age being 40 and up.

EXPENSE

Access-a-Ride

The south shore of Staten Island lacks public transportation. We have limited bus service. Our older

adults rely on car service which can be more expensive. We need to increase transportation service in our district. More Access-a-Ride service has to be provided. Also more buses to our senior citizens centers.

Social Adult Day Care – Respite Services

Our elderly who require this service must travel to other parts of Staten Island, many times sitting on a van or bus for over an hour. There should be a site on the south shore where our elderly can receive compassionate care within their own district. Respite allows caregivers and/or family members the occasional relief from the ongoing responsibility of caring for an elderly family member with peace of mind.

Home Care

This program must be expanded. More service from medical professionals, on a full or part time basis is essential. We believe home care services will be in very high demand as more patients are sent home from the hospital at a faster pace. These elderly patients require home health care and services.

Buildings Department

EXPENSE

Community Board #3 is requesting more inspectors to monitor all the building construction on the south shore of Staten Island. We are also requesting a night emergency squad to prevent illegal work on weekends and evenings.

Law Department – Office of the Corporation Counsel

Many of our Capital projects with DOT and DEP are being held up during the acquisition process. It is our understanding that DEP and DDC allocated funds to have another person in your department to work on these acquisitions.

We ask that the Law Department hire or assign attorneys to work on the workload of acquisitions in New York City. We cannot continue to push back projects for years just because the acquisition process moves so slowly. It is in the best interest of everyone to have more personnel working on acquisitions.


Department of Design and Construction
