
Excerpt from the Episode:

FRAN: Talk about the meaning of the parade here today. We've been talking about it and why in your role as the Veterans Department of New York City, how do we keep the military front and center as we come out of this global war on terror era and we move on to the next phase?

HENDON: I think a lot of this is making sure that our brothers and sisters know that we see them, that we appreciate them and that we love them. And so things like this, they're so symbolic, but they move mountains emotionally for a lot of our men and women who serve and their families. Just to know that you're not forgotten right now, when we look at the larger numbers, about 33.1% of all veterans, according to the

Gross Domestic Expenditure report from the VA, use VA services. Of those who are eligible, that means the remaining more than 65% don't use the services. We know. That number comes down to 29.7% in New York State. It comes down to 24.6% in New York City. In other words, I like to tell people when you see me, there are two to three brothers and sisters who you don't see. And so a lot of it is creating an environment where you have the psychological safety to feel comfortable coming out saying, hey, in need of some help, I need some services.

<u>Veterans Corner Radio</u> focuses on what Veterans and their families need to know to maximize the services and benefits due to them. No matter if someone is currently serving or left the military 50 years ago, the program provides answers to questions that Veterans didn't even know they should be asking. Each show is roughly a 15-minute investment in the future of Veterans and that of their families. The podcast's <u>web site</u> includes a library of shows featuring more than 140 interviews.

The Veterans Voice is a service of Mt. Carmel Veterans Service Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and is presented by the United States Automobile Association (USAA).


Two hosts of The Veterans Voice are Mike Lewis, a 30-year Veteran of the Navy Reserve, and Ted Robertson, who was raised in an Army family and raised a Marine. Their broadcast airs on KRDO 105.5 FM, 1240 AM and 92.5 FM in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Army Veteran Cassime Joseph hosts The Veterans Voice on KTSC 89.5 FM in Pueblo, Colorado. The show is also streamed on Wreaths Across America Radio and is available on more than a dozen podcast apps, including Amazon Music, Spotify, iHeartRadio, iTunes and Google.

Oscar Mike Radio is a show about real-life stories of active-duty military and Veterans, hosted by Marine Veteran Travis Partington. NYC Civil Service Job Openings and Exams



You served your country. Now serve your city!

Do your part to keep the city running! The <u>NYC Department of Citywide</u>

Administrative Services (DCAS) makes City government work for all New Yorkers.

There are many diverse career opportunities with NYC DCAS.

Veterans are no longer required to pay application fees for NYC Civil Service examinations. And Veteran Spouses are now eligible for a one-time application fee waiver for NYC Civil Service examinations.

See below for open competitive NYC Civil Service exam highlights:

Open Competitive Exams

Deckhand: Deckhands, under supervision, perform deckhand duties in compliance with agency standard operating procedures, the Safety Management System (SMS), the Combined Security Plan (CSP) and applicable local, state and federal rules and regulations on a municipal ferry vessel and at a ferry terminal. Deckhands clean the vessel and/or terminal area; perform lookout and emergency duties of the assigned duty station, such as: launching and manning rescue boats and life rafts, operating firefighting equipment, and assisting in vessel to vessel transfers, under the direction of an Officer; operate boarding doors, gates, aprons and bridges; handle gangways and mooring lines; direct passenger and authorized vehicle traffic, as assigned; patrol deck and assigned duty station and make minor maintenance updates to ensure that all is in a safe and clean condition; assist passengers, as needed; report any suspicious circumstance or object to an Officer or Ferry Terminal Supervisor; perform heavy manual labor, such as: handling vessel and terminal supplies and trash, loading and unloading freight, and snow and ice removal on vessels, terminals and docks using shovels, snow throwers and utility vehicles; participate in safety meetings, fire and lifeboat drills, steering, propulsion, anchor and abandon ship drills, and SMS and CSP training; and make announcements on vessels and in terminals. All Deckhands perform related work.

Dental Assistant: Dental Assistants (NYC Health + Hospitals), under direct supervision, assist dentists in providing dental services to patients in clinics and hospitals. They prepare patients for examination and treatment; assist dentists by handing them required instruments for the treatment of patients; prepare instruments for sterilization, disinfect surface areas, and maintain clinic and clinic equipment in a hygienic condition in accordance with proper infection control procedures; prepare examination room for procedures; take and upload dental digital imaging; mix amalgams, cements, composites, and related materials; perform laboratory procedures such as pouring and packaging models from impressions for prosthetics; maintain records of instruments and models; maintain clinic equipment to ensure that it is in working order; report shortages in supplies and materials and necessary equipment repairs; assist dentists in patient management; schedule patient appointments; enter and retrieve data and information into computerized systems; interact with patients and the public. All Dental Assistants (NYC Health + Hospitals) perform related work.

Forester: Foresters implement professional forestry plans regarding the selection, planting, pruning, repairing, spraying, removal, and inspection of city trees; collect data for work load planning and computer model simulation of work to be done by contractors for stump removal, tree pruning, tree planting and related urban forestry contracts; serve as borough liaison to central office staff for assigned contract work; prepare detailed specifications of agency forestry contracts; attend preconstruction meetings to discuss contract specifications, schedules and payment procedures; monitor daily progress of agency contractors and prepares daily status reports on agency contract work; report results and recommendations to supervisors; collect statistical data concerning mensuration measurements, silvics indicators, and physiological parameters in order to maintain a complete and accurate borough or citywide tree inventory update; modify micro and macro EDP software programs as required; provide professional support and follow-up on consultancy with private and municipal agencies and private individuals on forestry-related matters; conduct research and provides entomological and pathological surveys required for the development of plans and programs regarding forestry methods, practices and procedures; as a member of a team, participate in the preparation of reports for proposals, analyses and budget requests; may supervise subordinate employees involved in professional forestry activities; operate and maintain technical and professional instruments, kits and tools in the performance of the above mentioned professional research and survey duties; operate motorized equipment and vehicles incidental to the performance of these duties. All Foresters perform related work.

Traffic Device Maintainer: Traffic Device Maintainers, under direct supervision, prepare, install, maintain and repair vehicular traffic control devices; and drive motor vehicles. All Traffic Device Maintainers perform related work. Some of the physical activities performed by Traffic Device Maintainers and environmental conditions experienced are: curbside walking to inspect muni meters; bending and stooping during inspections; climbing ladders to inspect, remove and/or replace traffic control devices; heavy lifting of 50 pounds or more; operating all kinds of hand and motorized tools; driving boom trucks and tower trucks reaching heights up to 30 feet or more; driving a motor vehicle; and working outdoors in all kinds of weather.
