<p>Adoption & KinGAP Support Services (AKSS) is dedicated to increased rates of permanency and reduced lengths of stay for children in foster care, as well as the provision of post adoption assistance. AKSS works cross-divisionally with other ACS programs to ensure collaborative efforts with stakeholders such as provider agency staff, adoptive youth, adoptive parents, FCLS and adoption attorneys, Family Court and the Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) in working toward achieving and sustaining permanency. Under Adoption and KinGAP Support Services there are four functional areas: Adoption Subsidy Unit, Adoption Permanency Monitoring Unit, Kinship Guardianship Assistance Program (KinGAP) and Post Adoption Program. Additionally, as a recruitment resource for children in need of an adoptive resource, AKSS oversees the Wednesday's Child Program. The program is funded by a private grant through the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption.</p>

<p>The Adoption Permanency Monitoring Unit works closely with our foster care agencies and other key stakeholders to identify specific cases and agency trends in case practice that pose challenges to adoption finalizations. Technical assistance is provided, when necessary, to assist and address those barriers impeding the process. Every quarter, a spreadsheet of current freed children with a goal of adoption is provided to the agencies to focus efforts on moving these children to permanency. Along with the provider agencies and courts. The unit partners with the state to achieve adoption permanency.</p>

<p>The Adoption Subsidy Unit is responsible for receiving and reviewing subsidy requests from prospective adoptive parents to ensure they meet the requirements for Adoption Subsidy. Applications are forwarded from the contract agency when the termination of rights have been filed or the child is freed for adoption and adoptively placed. Once all documents are received, ASRU reviews for subsidy eligibility and Title IV-E eligibility. If subsidy is approved, ASRU supervisor signs off and forwards to NYSOCFS for approval.</p>

<p>The Office of Advocacy is a unit within ACS External Affairs that responds to the concerns of parents, youth, foster parents, and the general public about child welfare cases. Staff provide individual advocacy, ombudsman, and information and referral services to families served by the agency. We elevate systemic concerns with ACS leadership, and alert the administration to new or recurring issues and problems in the interests of continuous quality improvement. Office of Advocacy also oversees the participation of Parent Advocates in Initial Child Safety Conferences, citywide.</p>

<p>The Agency Program Assistance (APA) team's mission is to help improve the quality of services provided and the outcomes achieved by Children's Services provider agencies for New York City's children and families. Located within the Division of Policy, Planning and Measurement, the Agency Program Assistance (APA) unit is comprised of teams of performance monitors assigned to preventive and foster care providers. APA works collaboratively with both provider agencies and ACS stakeholders to improve performance. Through Collaborative Quality Improvement (CoQI) APA analyzes practice and outcome data collected to identify areas of strength and areas in need of improvement with each provider agency. APA works collaboratively with provider agencies throughout the CoQI cycle to develop priorities and Improvement plans. APA engages in ongoing and consistent dialogue with each provider agency regarding performance and progress on improvement plans.</p>

<p>The APPLA Monitoring Unit is responsible for tracking Preparing Youth for Adulthood (PYA) checklist submission. The unit performs random reviews assessing selected PYA transition plans (In-Care, Discharge and Supervision Until 21 checklists) completed by provider agencies for young people ages 17-21. Checklist documentation include: Housing; Health/Health Insurance; Educational/Vocational Opportunities; Employment Opportunities; Opportunities for Adult Permanency Resources; Continuing Support Systems and Vital Documents. The Unit meets on a quarterly basis with the provider community to report out on provider agency compliance ratings respectively; discuss provider agency challenges with checklist submission and provide technical assistance to improve permanency planning in order to impact positive outcomes for APPLA + youth transitioning to self-care.</p>

<p>ACS has established a new case consultation function within the Family Permanency Services Division to provide consultation, technical assistance and support to foster care agency staff on individual cases. This is a pilot program that will be implemented with 5 provider agencies. Currently 3 agencies (MercyFirst, Catholic Guardian Services, and Forestdale Inc.) have been engaged and 2 others will be selected. ACS Senior Practice Consultants (SPCs) will work directly and collaboratively with ACS' contracted foster care provider agencies to deepen and strengthen agency practice resulting in improved well-being, safety and permanency outcomes for children in foster care, reduced lengths of stay and rates of re-entry into foster care. It also provides that medical lens to support DCP, FPS, DYFJ and DPS in their assessment and practice. OCFH delivers direct medical services to children entering foster care, offers individual case consultations and training to ACS staff and foster care agencies on a variety of health-related topics, conducts research and provides clinical expertise in developing health and mental health policies that support best case practice. Dr. Angel Mendoza, Agency Medical Director, oversees the overall functioning of the Program.</p>

<p>The CSEN Unit assists foster care agencies and foster care parents to obtain reimbursement rates for children who have heightened physical and/or mental health needs. It reviews for approval special and exceptional rate requests that agencies submit, taking into account the child's medical, psychiatric, psychological or behavioral condition.</p>

<p>The Developmental Disabilities Unit enables ACS to coordinate efforts for providing supports, services and appropriate planning for children in foster care with developmental disabilities. The Unit outreaches daily to case planners, preventive agencies, CPS workers, provides case specific consultation, training on developmental disabilities, and establishes linkages to local community resources and services. The unit provides free psychological testing to children in foster care suspected of having a developmental disability and parents with suspected cognitive limitations. The DD Unit is the point of access for referrals for state OPWDD services and maintains the ACS/OPWDD Waitlist.</p>

<p>The Medical Audit Unit reviews foster care medical records to ensure compliance with the established health standards for children in foster care. It strives to ensure that all relevant ACS policies reflect the currently recognized best practices as identified by the American Academy of Pediatrics and other entities.</p>

<p>The Medical Consent Unit works closely with the foster care agencies, DCP, and the ACS Office of General Counsel to ensure children placed under Article 10 receive essential medical treatment when biological parents disagree, or are unable or unwilling to provide consent. It determines whether the proposed treatment is medically appropriate when seeking parental override, and reviews transfer applications of medically fragile children to skilled nursing facilities. The Unit provides support to the Special Care unit during SPRs and discharge planning of cases of children in skilled nursing facilities.</p>

<p>The Medical Consultation Program assists the Child Protective Specialists in their assessment of family functioning in regard to medical needs. They allocate medical resources, contact medical providers, and assist in building linkages to external partners in health care. The Medical Consultants are Nurse Practitioners with clinical experience in medical diagnoses, medications, and treatment, and are experts in child development and medical issues. The medical consultation program works collaboratively with the Clinical Consultation program and supports ACS' child protection staff in their decision-making surrounding issues of Medical, Mental Health, Domestic/Intimate Partner Violence, and Substance Use Disorder.</p>

<p>The Mental Health Coordination Unit is responsible to track psychiatrically hospitalized children in foster care and provides mental health technical assistance to case planners as requested. The three criteria for MHCU eligibility are: A child is in ACS Custody, under age 18, and is admitted to an acute psychiatric inpatient unit (not an Emergency Room, Children's Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Program, Extended Observation Bed, State hospital, or 21-day Crisis Respite Program). MHCU must be notified of acute inpatient psychiatric admissions and discharges within 24 hours. The unit works closely with case planning teams, acute hospitals that have inpatient child and adolescent psychiatric units, and OMH.</p>

<p>The PAU offers technical assistance to foster care agencies with issues relating to HIV. It provides consents for HIV testing for Article 10 children following ACS and state regulations, tracks test results and medical information on all HIV-infected children and perinatal exposed infants. The PAU delivers formal training and phone consultations to ACS and foster care agency staff on HIV risk assessment, testing and confidentiality, and ensures that HIV prevention strategies shared among foster care constituents are appropriate and based upon current best practice guidelines.</p>

<p>Nursing Services is responsible for the day-to-day nursing functions of the 24/7 operations at the Children's Center pre-placement, and the borough office medical units in the Bronx, Queens, and Brooklyn. This program provides complete physical assessments for all children entering foster care and direct primary care, and conducts medical case management of children residing at the Children's Center.</p>

<p>Under the supervision of the Medical Director of Psychiatric and Behavioral Health, the unit reviews override requests for consent for psychiatric medication, psychiatric hospitalizations, psychiatric and psychological evaluations, therapy and other mental health treatments or interventions when parents do not provide consent. In addition, the unit provides consultation on any concerns pertaining to the psychiatric or mental health care of children in the ACS system. The unit also provides psychiatric evaluations and care for children at the Children's Center: is initiating projects to improve the psychiatric and mental health care of foster children in the community; and providing training both within ACS and to outside agencies.</p>

<p>The Nicholas Scoppetta Children’s Center operates 24/7 and serves vulnerable children and youth who have experienced the trauma of abuse and neglect and removal from their families. Our mission is to provide a temporary living environment that is non-judgmental, supportive, caring, and structured that strives to heal past and ongoing trauma. Our vision is that children and youth will be prepared to transition to placement or achieve permanency after their stay at the Children’s Center. Pre-Placement Services (PPS) consists of an interdisciplinary team who provide trauma-informed direct care, therapeutic programming, medical and clinical services to children and youth residing at Children’s Center. Providing a therapeutic perspective influenced by best practices in clinical decision-making, the CCP provides clinical mental health expertise in five fields of practice including, Mental Health, Domestic Violence, Substance Use Disorders, Early Childhood Mental Health, and Adolescent Mental Health.</p> <p>The Clinical Consultation Program hopes to partner with the child welfare continuum to build capacity, promote best practice, and enhance efforts to serve children and families through assessments, consultations, office-based trainings, and appropriate interventions.</p>

<p>The Office of Community Engagement & Partnerships (OCEP) oversees 11 Community Partnership Programs (CPP)s, which are local provider networks composed of organizations and leaders. ACS funds CPPs in 11 neighborhoods: Staten Island, Elmhurst, Jamaica, East New York, Bushwick, Bedford-Stuyvesant, East Flatbush, Hunts Point, Mott Haven, Highbridge and East Harlem. Membership ranges between 30 and 60 individuals. CPP members support each other by inviting speakers and making referrals across organizations. Their primary goal is to build a strong primary prevention network and strategy that increases overall child and family well-being. The work of the CPP is led by a small core staff who are supported by Community Ambassadors. All CPPs have regular, open meetings where the community is invited to learn about resources and work collaboratively on a primary prevention priority selected by the community. For more information regarding the CPPs or to attend a local CPP meeting, contact Director Nigel Nathaniel or email the OCEP office at OCEPMailbox@acs.nyc.gov.</p> <p>OCEP also oversees three Family Enrichment Centers (FEC)s, which are warm, strength-based, home-like spaces where neighbors are able to connect, contribute to their community, find resources, support one another and build protective factors that help children and their families thrive. FECs are located in Highbridge, Hunts Point and East New York, are accessible and open to the community, free of charge. Referrals and appointments are not needed and there is no case management. A Parent Advisory Group works closely with the staff to help develop offerings for children and families such as movie night, computer classes, clothing drives, read-alouds, fathers’/men’s’ groups, family trips and a wide range of other community-designed activities that occur based on the community’s preferences. The primary purpose of the ACS Housing Subsidy, which is calculated in part on the client’s monthly rent charge, is to provide a time limit, financial supplement up-to \$300.00 monthly towards NYC market rate housing that lasts for a period up to 3 years or \$10,800, whichever comes first. The subsidy program provides for two special grants, each up to \$1800.00. One grant can be used towards rent or mortgage arrears and the other grant can be used towards costs associated with establishing an apartment; for foster care cases only, this special grant can also be utilized to purchase essential furniture.</p>

If the child is born outside of the city, the provider agency can send an e-mail to the birth certificate e-mail address detailing child's DOB and place of birth and the unit will provide information on specific documents and costs for the birth certificate and assist in obtaining the birth certificate from the other jurisdiction. Additionally, Foundling, Corrections and Delayed birth certificates are processed by this unit. To request a social security card for a youth in foster care, provider agency should send an e-mail to the social security e-mail address. Unit also processes child care referral forms for working foster parents who need child care for a child placed in their home. Both foster parents must be working if it is a 2-parent foster home. Exceptions to policy can be requested if medical documentation is submitted to support why the foster parent is not working, but still needs child care.</p>
