From that time on, all inmates who serve 30 consecutive days are released for at least seven days before they may return to punitive segregation, unless the Chief of Department has approved an override.

Punitive segregation has been eliminated for all inmates aged 16-21. Additionally, DOC has partnered with the Vera Institute of Justice to develop safe alternatives to segregation. This nearly two year project includes a year of policy and procedure assessment before reforms are recommended and implemented. DOC will share any recommendations with the Board when they are issued.
