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1 MR. PERALES: Good evening. My name is
2 Cesar Perales and I'm the chair of the 2018 New
3 York City Charter Revision Commission.

4 Welcome to everyone here. And those who are
5 viewing over the internet, this is a public
6 meeting of the Commission.

7 Let's begin as we usually do by asking the
8 commissioners to introduce themselves, not just
9 their name but to give us a sentence or two about
10 their background.

11 I will begin on my extreme right with
12 Larian.

13 MS. ANGELO: Good evening. Larian Angelo.
14 I'm on the Commission mostly because I've spent a
15 good part of my life in city government, mostly
16 in budgeting work. And I've really enjoyed my
17 time on the Commission very much.

18 MS. ARCHER: Hello, everyone. My name is
19 Deborah Archer. I'm a professor at NYU Law
20 School. And before becoming a law professor I
21 was an attorney with the NAACP, Legal Defense
22 Fund and with the ACLU.

23 MS. FERNANDEZ: My name is Angela Fernandez.
24 I'm the executive director and supervising
25 attorney of the Northern Manhattan Coalition For

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1 Immigrant Rights and I am also mayoral designee
2 to the Civilian Complaint Review Board.

3 MR. HO: Good evening. My name is Dale Ho
4 and I'm a lawyer at the American Civil Liberties
5 Union where I direct the ACLU Voting Rights
6 Project.

7 MS. GODSIL: Good evening. My name is
8 Rachel Godsil. I'm a professor at Rutgers Law
9 School and also the co-founder and director of
10 research for the Perception Institute which is a
11 consortium of social psychologists, researchers
12 and others looking for ways that social sciences
13 can be used to translate into addressing issues
14 and challenges linked to identify, ethnicity,
15 race and other lines of difference.

16 I've also been the chair of the Ranked
17 Guidelines Board and has been very honored to be
18 on the Commission.

19 MR. PERALES: As I said my name is Cesar
20 Perales. Until about two years ago I was
21 secretary of State of New York. I previously
22 served as a deputy mayor of New York City. And
23 in a prior life I was a civil rights lawyer that
24 litigated issues regarding voting rights against
25 The City of New York.

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1 MR. SCISSURA: Good evening. Carlo
2 Scissura. I serve as president and CEO of the
3 New York Building Congress. Prior to that I was
4 president of Brooklyn Chamber Congress and served
5 as chief of staff to Borough President Marty
6 Markowitz.

7 This is actually my second Charter Review
8 Commission. It's been a pleasure to serve with
9 all of you.

10 MR. MIROCZNIK: Good evening. My name is
11 Mendy Mirocznik. I am the president of COJO
12 Staten Island. It's a pleasure to be here this
13 evening. Humbled to see all of you.

14 MS. SEECHARRAN: Good evening. My name is
15 Annetta Seecharran and I'm the executive director
16 of Chhaya Community Development Corporation.

17 MR. SIEGAL: John Siegal. I'm a partner in
18 the Baker & Hostetler law firm and a mayoral
19 appointee to the CCRB and perhaps most germane to
20 some of the work in this Commission. I've
21 represented citywide political campaigns before
22 the Campaign Finance Board for 20 years or so.

23 MS. WEISER: Hello. My name is Wendy
24 Weiser. I direct the democracy program at the
25 Brennan Center of Justice at NYU School of Law.

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1 And it's been a real pleasure to serve with this
2 Commission.

3 MR. PERALES: Let me note for the record as
4 we begin that we have a quorum.

5 The purpose of today's meeting is to discuss
6 the ballot questions that, if adopted today by
7 the Commission, will be put before the voters in
8 November, as well as the final report that
9 reflects the full body of the Commission's work.

10 The legislation, ballot language and the
11 final report has been sent to all the
12 commissioners in advance of the meeting and I am
13 confident they have all read them carefully.

14 The legislation, ballot language in the
15 final report are all available now to the members
16 of the public on the Commission's website.

17 By law this Commission reviewed the entire
18 City Charter. We set out ways to identify civic
19 life in New York City and through an extensive
20 and very thoughtful process that included
21 outreach to New York communities everywhere. I
22 believe that we've done that very well.

23 More than one thousand ideas to revise the
24 charter was submitted by New Yorkers from all of
25 the five boroughs.

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1 This has been a thoughtful and engaging
2 process and I hope the public is pleased and I
3 hope my fellow Commissioners are pleased. And I
4 will thank them later but I wanted to make sure
5 they understood I've had the pleasure doing this
6 only because these Commissioners has been so
7 diligent and so thoughtful and so engaging.

8 I think that by reducing the corrupting
9 influence of money in politics by improving an
10 increasing civic engagement and reforming our
11 community boards, we are helping to create a city
12 that is more fair and more justice and one where
13 everyone has a voice in the future of our city.

14 Again, I'd like to thank the members of the
15 public who testified throughout the process.

16 I will now ask the Commission's Executive
17 Director Mat Gewolb to briefly describe the
18 proposals which we expect to vote today.

19 Mat.

20 MR. GEWOLB: Thanks very much, the Chair and
21 Commissioners.

22 First, just on a personal note I'd like to
23 give a very special acknowledgment to the
24 fabulous staff who has been working day and night
25 throughout the process to prepare these proposals

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1 and really appreciate everyone's work.

2 In a few moments I'll read aloud each of the
3 ballot proposals. After Commissioner discussion
4 the chair will ask for a roll call vote on each
5 ballot question. After each of the votes on the
6 three ballot questions, the chair will ask for a
7 roll call vote on the final report.

8 And finally, the chair will call for a vote
9 on the Commission resolution which essentially
10 delegates to the staff their responsibility for
11 getting these materials filed with the city clerk
12 and taking other technical actions to make sure
13 they appear on the ballot and that voters are
14 educated about that.

15 So Mr. Chair, if you are ready for this, I
16 can read the ballot proposals.

17 MR. PERALES: Well, I just wanted to
18 interject for a moment that we heard from our
19 Commissioners last time we met and all the
20 Commissioners expressed their gratitude to the
21 staff. I want to reiterate that and join you in
22 thanking the staff for all the work they have
23 done.

24 So Mat, with that will you read the ballot
25 initiatives?

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1 MR. GEWOLB: Absolutely.

2 Question one on campaign finance: This
3 proposal will amend the City Charter to lower the
4 amount a candidate for city elective office may
5 accept from a contributor. We would also
6 increase the public funding use to match a
7 portion of the contributions received by a
8 candidate who participates in the City's public
9 finance program, financing program.

10 In addition, the proposal will make public
11 matching funds available earlier in the election
12 year to participating candidates who can
13 demonstrate needs for the funds. It would also
14 ease the requirement that candidates for mayor,
15 comptroller or public advocate must meet to
16 qualify for matching funds.

17 The amendments that apply to participating
18 candidates who chose to have the amendments a
19 part of their campaign beginning with the 2021
20 primary election and would then apply to all
21 candidates beginning in 2022.

22 MR. PERALES: Can I interrupt for just a
23 moment?

24 MR. GEWOLB: Yes.

25 MR. PERALES: Do we have the actual ballot

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1 language in front of us?

2 MR. GEWOLB: Yes --

3 MR. PERALES: Where is it?

4 MR. GEWOLB: -- the ballot language as well
5 as --

6 MR. PERALES: Is it in the final report?

7 MR. GEWOLB: Yup, yup. It is in the final
8 report.

9 MR. PERALES: Want to give us a page?

10 MR. GEWOLB: Sure.

11 MR. HO: (Inaudible.)

12 MR. PERALES: Dale thinks it's 42; is that
13 right?

14 MR. GEWOLB: Yes. Each of them -- each of
15 the sections, the three sections, campaign
16 finance, civic engagement, community boards, have
17 the ballot proposal for campaign finance.
18 Looking at the table of contents would be 42.

19 MR. PERALES: We got it. Thank you.

20 MR. GEWOLB: Okay. Before I move on to
21 ballot question number two there are just a
22 couple of notes on campaign and finance that we
23 wanted to mention.

24 First, on implementation: As you know there
25 is a difficult decision to make about whether

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1 this new system should go into effect immediately
2 for this cycle. Should we put off until the next
3 election cycle or whatever candidates for this
4 cycle should be given a choice between the two
5 systems.

6 Ultimately, the majority of commissioners
7 supported a choice but certainly reasonable minds
8 can disagree on this point. We very much
9 appreciate the engagement of many commissioners
10 working towards this particular resolution.

11 Want to note one additional feature of the
12 proposal which is a recent change. Under this
13 proposal, candidates who opt to participate in
14 public financing will be required to file a
15 nonbonding statement of intent to operate under
16 the new or old system upon filing their first
17 campaign disclosure report with the CFB. That's
18 language that's contained in the addendum that's
19 with your package.

20 On the previous version no such statement of
21 intent was required. The final deadline for
22 making a choice will remain the date the
23 candidate submits their certification to
24 participate in the public financing program.

25 This change is reflected in the addendum supplied

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1 alongside the ballot copy of the report, as I
2 said.

3 And finally, in the development of this
4 campaign finance proposal Commission staff
5 received input from various stakeholders
6 including a number of candidates or potential
7 candidates intending to run in the 2021 election
8 cycle. And many of those candidates expressed a
9 very favorable view of the new system set forth
10 in this proposal. So with that we can move on to
11 the next ballot question which I'll read and is
12 also available in the packet. This is the ballot
13 question on civic engagement. This proposal will
14 amend the City Charter to create a civic
15 engagement Commission that will implement no
16 later than the City fiscal year beginning
17 July 1st, 2020. A citywide participatory
18 budgeting program established by the mayor to
19 prompt participation by city residents and making
20 recommendations for projects in their communities
21 require the Commission to partner with community
22 based organizations on civic leaders as well as
23 other city agencies to support and encourage
24 civic engagement efforts require the Commission
25 to establish a program to provide language

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1 interpreters at city poll sites to be implemented
2 for the general election in 2020, permit the
3 mayor to assign relevant powers and duties of
4 certain mother city agencies to the Commission,
5 provide that the civic engagement will have 15
6 members with eight appointed by the mayor, two
7 members by the City Council speaker and one
8 member by each borough president and provide for
9 one of the mayor's appointees to be Commission
10 chair and for the chair to employ and direct
11 Commission staff the question: Shall this
12 proposal be adopted?

13 And of course, all of the legislation --
14 this is the language that, if approved, would
15 appear on the ballot and all the legislation that
16 would be triggered is also in the packets.

17 And finally, the third question is on
18 community boards. This proposal will amend the
19 City Charter to impose term limits of a maximum
20 of four consecutive full two-year terms for
21 community board members with certain exceptions
22 for the initial transition to the new term limit
23 system. Require borough presidents to seek out
24 persons of diverse backgrounds and making
25 appointments to community boards.

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1 The proposal would also add new application
2 and reporting requirements related to these
3 appointments. And if question two, civic
4 engagement commission is approved, require the
5 proposed civic engagement commission to provide
6 resources, assistance and training related to
7 land use and other manners -- matters to
8 community boards shall this proposal be adopted.

9 Okay. Mr. Chair, those are the three ballot
10 questions for consideration.

11 MR. PERALES: Before I ask for a vote, what
12 I'd like to do is, given the commitment that's
13 been expressed by the Commission members, I'd
14 like to give each one of them an opportunity to
15 make a brief statement on how they feel about
16 these proposals.

17 So again, let me begin -- well, let me begin
18 with the officers. No? Yes? Let's begin with
19 the vice chair.

20 MS. GODSIL: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Thank
21 you so much to the staff and Matt for the
22 extraordinary amount of work that has been done.

23 This process has been an extraordinary
24 inspiring one. The combination of public
25 hearings in every borough prior to determining

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1 our areas of focus and then a second round of
2 hearings in each borough along with panels
3 comprised of people with specific expertise with
4 contrasting views to determine what areas of
5 focus we should -- what areas of focus should be
6 explored and then ultimately the specific
7 proposals to be put before the voters was, again,
8 a ground up process in which, if we listen to New
9 Yorkers, and our hope is, of course, that we're
10 putting proposals before New Yorkers that
11 they/we, because of course we're New Yorkers as
12 well, will consider will make our democracy
13 better.

14 The focus on campaign finance has the
15 intention of enhancing legitimacy and trust we
16 have in city governance.

17 Civic engagement, a process by which this
18 kind of engagement we were able to really sort of
19 see flourish in this process will be enhanced
20 broadly across all areas of civic engagement and
21 governance including participatory budgeting
22 which empowers people in profound ways over
23 issues that matter in their City Council
24 districts.

25 And finally, and this was an area that I

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1 don't think any of us anticipated would be an
2 area of focus when we began this process, the
3 idea of term limits for community boards which we
4 heard with enormous passion both from current
5 members of community boards who served for a long
6 time and we have so much respect for all of the
7 -- everything they've contributed but also from
8 people who've recently served at community boards
9 that the process of trying to ensure true
10 representation has been a challenging one, this
11 is an issue of importance that seemed to inspire
12 a great deal of interest.

13 We also explored ranked choice voting which
14 has enormous possibility but ultimately decided
15 that more information was necessary prior to
16 bringing such an important proposal to the
17 voters.

18 And the final that was explored, which would
19 have been, again, we would have liked to put
20 before the voters was the question of
21 redistricting. However, out of respect for New
22 Yorkers, out of respect for our process in which
23 all stakeholders had a voice, we ultimately
24 determined, I think rightly, that we weren't
25 quite ready.

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1 So thank you to everyone in New York who
2 participated in this process and certainly to
3 everyone in this Commission who've shared all
4 their expertise.

5 MR. PERALES: Thank you.

6 Mr. Secretary, do you have any comments
7 you'd like to make?

8 MR. SCISSURA: Thank you. I will be very
9 brief.

10 First of all, I think we're all going to
11 agree that Matt, you and the team did a great job
12 so why don't we just give them a round of
13 applause and we've said it for everybody. Thank
14 you for all that you have done. It was a short
15 period of time but a lot went into it.

16 I think I echo much of what the vice chair
17 said. This has been a really exciting process.
18 As I said earlier, my second go around. And I
19 think when you serve on these types of
20 commissions more than once you really get a feel
21 for how government operates.

22 And while I don't necessarily agree with
23 every word that is written in this document, I do
24 agree that we are reflecting really what we have
25 heard throughout the boroughs. And we've been in

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1 boroughs many times. There has been smaller
2 events, larger events, but I think I am proud to
3 say that the opportunity for people to be heard
4 across the city was given, was encouraged. And
5 if you actually read the report you will see that
6 the Commission and the staff in particular took
7 the time to put into words what we heard out
8 there. So I think it's an overall great report.

9 I will just stress that I wish on the
10 campaign finance that we took a little different
11 approach but it does reflect the will of what we
12 heard and the will of the majority of the
13 Commission.

14 And on a final note, Chairman, you've been
15 great. I know we took a lot of your summer away
16 from you but that's okay because you are a
17 servant of New Yorkers and we'll have to find
18 something next for you to do after this.

19 Thank you, everybody.

20 MR. PERALES: Thank you, Carlo.

21 I don't want to put pressure on anybody to
22 discourse on our process and our policy statement
23 so if you don't feel obliged to really comment
24 further I'll understand that.

25 But I will start again on my extreme right

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1 with Larian Angelo.

2 MS. ANGELO: I'm extremely happy with the
3 way the Commission conducted the business. The
4 staff was wonderful.

5 I support the proposal without reservation.

6 MS. ARCHER: Just very briefly I want to
7 echo the thanks that everyone has expressed for
8 the staff and also my fellow commissioners.

9 One thing that we were asked to do and asked
10 to evaluate was to look for ways to increase
11 opportunities for civic participation and civic
12 engagement but also was important to consider
13 ways to make sure that every New Yorker had the
14 ability to exercise their most fundamental right,
15 the right to vote. And for that reason I'm
16 particularly proud that we've included the
17 expanded language assistance provision going
18 above and beyond what the state requires and what
19 the federal government requires to make sure that
20 in our very diverse city that everyone has the
21 ability to truly exercise their right to vote.

22 DR. CLARKE: I'm Una Clarke and I'm the late
23 member to arrive.

24 MR. SCISSURA: Dr. Clarke, are you late just
25 in getting here or late in general? I was very

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1 worried yesterday.

2 DR. CLARKE: I am also a trustee for the
3 City of New York and today is the first day of
4 class and I was at Bronx Community College and I
5 underestimated the time that it would take to get
6 here so I'm arriving late.

7 So I'm a former member of the City Council
8 and I am a creature of the Charter Revision.
9 When the council was increased from 35 to 51 I
10 became one of those members so I know the power
11 of the people and their will when they want to
12 make change. And I listen very carefully and
13 knew that all of my colleagues, commissioners,
14 put their all into it in hearing, listening and
15 then to ask Matt to put it in writing. And I'm
16 very proud of what we put together.

17 I vote aye. And I am anxious to educate
18 voters for my community, what it means for them.

19 MS. FERNANDEZ: I want to thank the chair
20 for leading this Commission as well as he did,
21 especially throughout the summer. And I
22 especially want to thank also the staff for all
23 of their hard work. Their consistent phone calls
24 and updating all of us on anything that we needed
25 to know.

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1 I'm especially proud of the campaign finance
2 reform especially the expanded matching. I think
3 that that will broaden the pool of candidates
4 that will consider running in the future. And I
5 have my own questions around the term limits for
6 the community boards. It definitely reflects
7 what the community wanted. This issue came up
8 consistently throughout the hearings but since
9 some of the details, I may have approached it a
10 little bit differently but I will go with the
11 majority of the Commission on this.

12 MR. HO: I just want to echo the thanks that
13 has been expressed to the staff who has been
14 extraordinary putting together a really terrific
15 report under very difficult time constraints.
16 I'm very grateful personally to all of you for
17 the work that you put in on this and the thanks
18 that has been expressed to our chairman for
19 herding the cats that are all up here and getting
20 this across the finish line.

21 I want to acknowledge that not everyone will
22 agree with the precise contours with everything
23 that is going to be on the ballots in November
24 but I think that's okay because this is not the
25 end of the process. It's just the beginning.

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1 Voters themselves are going to have the
2 opportunity to have the final say on whether or
3 not any of these proposals ultimately become a
4 part of the City Charter. And if any of them do,
5 I don't think anyone can complain about the
6 legitimacy of a process in which New Yorkers
7 themselves get to decide what the Charter will
8 look like.

9 MR. PERALES: Before I move on to Mendy, let
10 me just echo the comment made by Commissioner Ho.

11 Our job was to try to figure out what could
12 make our city more just, more fair, and more
13 democratic and then to put it on the ballot to
14 see if New Yorkers wanted the City to be run in
15 this new fashion. That's what we did. I think
16 we did that well and it's going to be up to the
17 voters in November to determine whether or not
18 they agree that these things would be better for
19 our city.

20 With that, Mendy.

21 MR. MIROCZNIK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
22 All of us in this Commission read this report,
23 the computerized form. This is a momentous
24 document. It took the staff hours to put
25 together. Reading it I can visualize the

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1 testimony this Commission heard. The chairman
2 and a couple of times the vice chair were
3 gracious enough and the commissioners agreed to
4 go without time limitations for the public to
5 express how they feel.

6 This is important because the chair and the
7 vice chair and my fellow commissioners are all
8 volunteers. Our compensation is one idea: Is to
9 see the City become more fair, more democratic,
10 and more importantly just and to put people back
11 into the equation.

12 Now, I don't expect everybody to through
13 everything in this book. All of us are
14 intelligent people. New Yorkers are smart
15 people. We disagree on a lot of things. But I
16 do believe the common denominator of the thread
17 is when you look at civic engagement, which
18 unfortunately needs to be improved, you look at
19 issues of campaign finance and all the testimony,
20 what goes on, how people need to feel confidence,
21 and community boards, all these important issues,
22 I think this Commission has taken it to a notch
23 higher.

24 Unfortunately, there's a realty of time
25 constraints. And the hard working staff, Matt

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1 and his team did not ignore the other issues we
2 explored.

3 As everything else in life, I feel very
4 accomplished we achieved all of that. We opened
5 the door for discussion. We didn't hide any
6 issues. When the public testified on ranked
7 choice voting or other issues that are not ballot
8 proposals, we had serious discussions, heated
9 spirited debates in good faith. And passing on
10 the information and making the public knowledge,
11 only helped those.

12 The pen is mightier than the sword. The
13 words were out there and hopefully future
14 commissions and future generations will tackle.
15 Our job is to make sure that people in the
16 equation and they understand what has to be
17 analyzed further down.

18 MS. SEECHARRAN: I too want to add my thanks
19 to the staff for an extraordinary amount of work,
20 a tremendous job in pulling together such a wide
21 range of ideas. I remember halfway through the
22 process thinking how we're ever going to whittle
23 all of this down into some coherent proposals and
24 you've done it so thank you for that.

25 Also, it's been an incredible pleasure to

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1 serve on this Commission with some of the
2 smartest people in the city, very thoughtful.
3 And from whom I've learned quite a lot. I feel
4 very good about the process. I feel very good
5 about what we have -- what we are putting forward
6 today. And I do believe -- and I'm looking
7 forward to see how this plays out and truly
8 impacts our city and improves democracy.

9 I want to say for the record that I hope
10 that the next Commission will seriously consider
11 the redistricting process. And I regret that we
12 did not have sufficient time to delve into that
13 issue and be able to put forward something that
14 could go to the ballot because I do believe that
15 that is one of the sort next big issue facing the
16 city in terms of true representation and
17 inclusion of our diverse and fabulous city.
18 Thank you.

19 MR. SIEGEL: I repeat and incorporate the
20 comments I made at the last meeting regarding the
21 members of the Commission the chair the staff and
22 the merits of the proposal. I limit my comments
23 now only to refinements that have occurred since
24 we adopted the directional proposals at the last
25 meeting.

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1 I disagree with the implementation
2 provisions of the campaign finance proposal. I
3 do not think it is wise public policy to have a
4 situation in which regulated parties get to make
5 the decision as to whether they will or will not
6 follow new regulations. I cannot think of
7 another situation in which a regulatory agency
8 has been put in that position. I do not think
9 it's necessary. I actually don't think there's
10 any benefit to it.

11 I think that changing the rules two and a
12 half years before the election when everyone in
13 the political community in New York knew this was
14 going to happen and everybody has months to raise
15 money now under the old system before the new
16 regulations are implemented and years to deal
17 with it before the next election. I don't see
18 the value of it.

19 I do think that as the education campaign
20 around this proposal goes forward in the fall and
21 the public focuses on it that people who are
22 going to be in the campaign finance system will
23 come to realize that they are better off, as is
24 the City better off, with lower contribution
25 limits and higher matching rates.

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1 I think that as a lawyer who's dealt with
2 this and an advisor of campaigns who's dealt with
3 this that when you do the math you'll realize
4 that there is no advantage to remaining under the
5 old limits. And I would encourage all of us and
6 everybody who's followed the work of this
7 Commission to advocate strongly that people opt
8 in under the new rules and that as time plays out
9 the 2021 election will be under universal and on
10 a consensus basis the new rules that we're
11 establishing.

12 And I think that the process of educating
13 the public and the political community on that
14 will be beneficial and will end up in a very good
15 place in a system that maintains the balance
16 between public and private funding.

17 I happen to be someone who thinks that being
18 able to raise money from the people who are
19 invested in the City and can give larger amounts
20 of contributions is actually a positive part of
21 our campaign process so long as it's balanced by
22 public funding for those who are maybe of lesser
23 means and come from communities of lesser means.
24 And I think struck the right balance and I think
25 the public will realize that over time.

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1 MS. WEISER: In both thanking the chair and
2 the staff. I don't think people realize how much
3 work went into pulling together, sifting through
4 all of the proposals, preparing all of the
5 meeting, pulling all the research, getting us all
6 together onboard and liaising with all of the
7 effected communities agencies offices in such a
8 short period of time and it's really been
9 remarkable and they did a terrific job.

10 And I just want to put that out there again
11 because I've really been quite impressed and I've
12 also been really thrilled to work with my fellow
13 commissioners, many of which of I hadn't met
14 before and think it's really been an honor to
15 serve with you all.

16 I want to say that I am pleased with the
17 proposals that we are putting forward and I
18 wanted to just emphasize a few things on the
19 campaign finance proposals. We are strengthening
20 what is already an incredibly strong system and I
21 want to reiterate that the New York City system
22 really is a model for the country. It was an
23 innovation that other people are picking up on
24 and trying to emulate in amplifying the doses of
25 small donors and reducing corporation across the

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1 city.

2 It is also administered very ably and
3 effectively by a terrific agency in the Campaign
4 Finance Board and it's really done a great
5 service to democracy in New York.

6 At that said, it can be improved upon. And
7 I think we've done that. There are some areas
8 that there was still some room for corruption
9 where in particular with the high contribution
10 limits among the highest in the country and I
11 think that reducing that, amplifying the value of
12 the small donations making the resources
13 available sooner to candidates is going to make a
14 real difference in improving an already excellent
15 system on the implementation.

16 While I do share the concern about having a
17 choice I am heartened by the assurances that this
18 is really unlikely to come to pass, that everyone
19 is really likely to follow the new system. It is
20 the one that makes much more sense. It is the
21 one that is better for New York.

22 And want to reiterate what my fellow
23 commissioner urged that we should all also
24 advocate for everybody to chose the new system
25 and going forward we're not just adopting a

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1 charter for the next election. We're adopting it
2 for the rest of time in New York and this is an
3 improvement on the system.

4 I went to just speak also briefly on the
5 civic engagement and just flagging that this is a
6 real innovative reform and putting New York in a
7 kind of innovative space and expanding civic
8 engagement in -- nationally with expanding
9 participatory budgeting having a specific
10 Commission designed to do that. And it's great
11 that we're experimenting in that way and trying
12 to get ahead of the pack.

13 I want to flag that there are many issues
14 that were not dealt with that advocates or
15 community members brought up. There wasn't
16 enough time to deal with everything.

17 And I want to say that it still makes a
18 difference to come to these hearings and to raise
19 these issues, that they get heard in the
20 political process and I urge you to continue
21 advocating for those issues. This isn't the last
22 Charter Revision Commission and this isn't the
23 only forum in which to have those changes
24 considered in New York. And it's really been an
25 honor and a privilege to hear all of those

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1 recommendations and concerns.

2 And I also want to elevate to in particular,
3 which I did last time, again on the redistricting
4 reform. I want to reiterate that I am
5 disappointed that we were unable to get that
6 completed but we have a very strong
7 recommendation in this report that the next
8 Commission preferably before the next
9 redistricting cycle actually take up this issue
10 and make the redistricting process more fair and
11 independent and responsive to all New Yorkers and
12 I hope that comes to past.

13 And also wanted to elevate ranked choice
14 voting which I think can -- while more work
15 needed to be done to work through the details I
16 think that this is a very strong proposal for the
17 city and one that I hope gets taken up by future
18 commissions.

19 And with that, I just want today thank
20 everybody for being here and it's been a real
21 privilege and look forward to seeing this move
22 forward in the political process.

23 MR. PERALES: Thank you all.

24 I think the comments by the commissioners
25 just to confirm what I thought and said that

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1 we've got a very thoughtful, very solid
2 Commission. And I'm very proud of having been
3 chair. And that I think we've accomplished a
4 great deal. With that I want to proceed to
5 accomplish.

6 I'm going to entertain a motion to vote a
7 first ballot proposal which is the one that
8 relates to campaign finance.

9 Is there a motion?

15 approve the resolution and direct the staff to
16 take appropriate actions?

19 public is educated about the implementation of
20 this. Thank you.

21 MR. PERALES: I quite agree.

22 But I take it your vote is, yes?

23 DR. CLARKE: Yes. Oh, yes.

24 our wonderful general counsel who, by the way,
25 has done together with all our colleagues

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1 extraordinary work.

2 MR. PERALES: And what is this document?

3 MR. GEWOLB: Christine, would you like to
4 explain the document?

5 MS. BILLY: All right. So this is a
6 resolution passed by this Commission directing
7 staff. We'll ask you to each sign two copies.
8 It's the identical version. One that we keep on
9 file with the Commission and that will be
10 archived and one that will be filed with the city
11 clerk along with the final report and ballot
12 proposals. So please pass it over and sign your
13 name on both copies.

14 MR. PERALES: While that is going on, let me
15 just say it's been good working with you all.
16 I've enjoyed the process. I hope it hasn't been
17 too painful for too many of you.

18 Rachel, your thoughts?

19 MS. GODSIL: I, again, thanks to the chair.
20 This has been an extraordinary honor to serve as
21 vice chair to your chair and we just -- I think
22 all of us are very grateful for the leadership
23 that you provided so perhaps applause from the
24 commissioners to the chair.

25 (Applause.)

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1 MR. PERALES: Thank you. Carlo, any last
2 thoughts?

3 MR. SCISSURA: No, just -- the one thought I
4 have is everyone needs to do another Charter
5 Commission so you know what it's like having gone
6 through two over the summer.

7 MR. PERALES: The documents are working
8 their way down.

9 I do know that I've been warned that some of
10 the Commission members may be called upon to help
11 educate the public so be prepared if there's an
12 opportunity for you to speak on the radio or
13 something about our process and why we did this.
14 We can't advocate. I think we can educate and I
15 think that's important that people understand
16 what these ballot measures mean to the people in
17 The City of New York.

18 MR. SCISSURA: I do have one question, Matt,
19 maybe you can answer: When is our service on the
20 Commission terminated? Is it today? Is it
21 November?

22 MR. GEWOLB: No, you're -- fortunately, I'm
23 glad you asked because, Mr. Secretary, the
24 service continues until Election Day. The
25 Commission is an existence and will be until

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1 Election Day, until the general election.

2 Between now and then the plan is to engage
3 in public education, as the chair mentioned. And
4 so for those of you who are willing and very much
5 like to work with you to find ways for you to be
6 out in the community speaking to people about
7 these proposals.

8 MR. SCISSURA: So that means all rules for
9 commissioners continue through Election Day?

10 MR. GEWOLB: Yes, that's right.

11 DR. CLARKE: I just wanted to -- I just
12 wanted to ask now that we talk about language and
13 expansion of making sure that every community in
14 our languages, are we going to be putting
15 advertising in community based newspapers and
16 media that will help them to understand what this
17 means.

18 MR. GEWOLB: Thanks. Yeah, we have drawn up
19 plans to do a really broad based outreach
20 program. That we make sure reaches all
21 communities.

22 Actually. As part of that in something that
23 you participated and other commissioners we did
24 an initial meeting with community media and will
25 continue to engage them, absolutely. And also

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1 looking at other ways -- all the means at our
2 disposal to help people to learn about the --
3 these proposals, the work the Commission has
4 done.

5 MR. PERALES: I think we're just about
6 finished signing.

7 MS. WEISER: Almost.

8 MR. PERALES: Given that, I will entertain
9 one more motion known as the motion to adjourn.

10 SPEAKER 2: So moved.
