1. **Organizations should express their interest in providing community-based health programming, primary health care services, behavioral health services or dental care services in DOHMH’s former clinic sites by submitting the attached Expression of Interest on or before 2:00 pm on May 1, 2015 to expressionofinterest@health.nyc.gov.**

2. Changes to the RFEI

- a) DOHMH is requesting that each organization submit their own Expression of Interest. If DOHMH receives any Expressions of Interest that indicate the names of more than one entity, DOHMH will ask those organizations to submit separate Expressions of Interest.
- b) The Hub site at the Williamsburg Health Center, 151 Maujer Street, Brooklyn, New York, is no longer part of this Requests for Expressions of Interest. The available sites are:

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3. Questions and answers raised at a pre-application meeting or submitted to DOHMH

IT Questions

Question: Will hard-wire internet and phone ports be available or can organizations utilize DOHMH's computer system?

Answer: Hubs will have public Wi-Fi. DOHMH will not provide wired networking systems/service or phone systems/service. Hub partners can provision their own wired networking systems/service and phone systems/service in the health hub sites - subject to review and approval by DOHMH.

Eligibility Questions

Question: Has DOHMH considered this initiative with regard to DSRIP? Would these sites be required to be members of the One City Health (HHC) pps?

Answer: We are open to working with the partners, regardless of their participation in DSRIP.

Question: What will reject you from the application process?

Answer: There are no specific "rejection" criteria for this process, but please keep in mind that DOHMH is only seeking Expressions of Interest from Community-Based Organizations (CBOs), Article 28/Diagnostic and Treatment Center providers (DTCs), Article 31/ Mental Health Clinics, Article 32 Medically Supervised Outpatient Clinic for substance use disorder treatment, and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) that are interested in providing community-based health programming, primary health care services, or dental care services.

Question: Is DOHMH open to requests that propose to serve a target population with disparities within targeted neighborhoods (e.g. LGBT persons, homeless persons)?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Will DOHMH consider mental, behavioral-emotional, or dental health programs as partners?

Answer: Yes, we will consider these types of programs.

Question: What qualifies as a community-based organization?

Answer: We are defining community-based organization broadly.

Question: Does an organization have to be a direct service organization to be considered for the Hub?

Answer: No.

Question: Can a new program or a startup organization apply?

Answer: Yes, there are no minimum requirements.

Question: Are Article 31 clinics eligible?

Answer: Yes.

Question: We are a community-based social service agency. Never having been involved in an aggregate setting previously, are we eligible?

Answer: Yes.



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Question: Does the provider need to be based in the neighborhood where the Hub is located in order to obtain space in the Hub?

Answer: No.

Question: Do faith-based organizations qualify for space?

Answer: Faith-based organizations are encouraged to apply and can check the Community-Based Organizations box on the Expression of Interest form.

Question: Are private medical practices, with deep roots in the community, eligible for this program?

Answer: Private practices are not eligible to receive space. However, all organizations will be welcomed into the neighborhood planning processes, which will begin after the RFEI process is completed.

Question: Is DOHMH looking specifically for organizations that have walk-in clients?

Answer: No, DOHMH will consider all types of organizations that further the mission of DOHMH.

Question: Does an organization have to have pre-existing contracts with DOHMH to be considered for the Hub?

Answer: No.

Question: Can an organization operate in more than one Hub?

Answer: This is not precluded.

Question: How will supportive housing and affordable housing organizations be involved?

Answer: All organizations that further the mission of DOHMH are encouraged to submit an expression of interest.

Question: The Expression of Interest form asks applicants to check off the services they provide. Are these the only services being considered or can we provide additional services?

Answer: DOHMH is seeking community-based health programming, primary health care services, behavioral health services or dental care services. If you currently provide services that fall into one of these categories, but are not listed on the RFEI, you can write in that service

Application and Selection Questions

Question: How will DOHMH determine an organization's ability to work well with other organizations during the application process?

Answer: Organizations will be asked to demonstrate this ability in their applications.

Question: If we propose providing several services and only a few fit into the community needs, would you disqualify the application or negotiate a new service proposal?

Answer: The Expression of Interest Form asks for the Services Currently provided; it does not ask that you propose services to be provided at the Hub. Please indicate all services currently provided.



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Question: I feel I need a personal interview and Q&A particular to our needs and yours. How can this be arranged?

Answer: We are unable to have discussions with individual entities at this time.

Question: How will the organizations and FQHCs be selected?

Answer: Applications will be evaluated based on the applicant's experience, organizational capability, and proposed approach to providing services at DOHMH's former clinic sites. DOHMH reserves the right to request both additional information and that applicants make presentations, as DOHMH deems applicable and appropriate. Awards will be made to the responsible applicants whose applications are determined to be the most advantageous to the City, taking into consideration the type of organization submitting the application and other factors or criteria which are set forth in the RFEI. DOHMH reserves the right to skip over one or more applicants in order to ensure that the selected organizations provide as many of the services indicated in the RFEI as space in each former clinic permits. DOHMH reserves the right to negotiate with viable applicants for sites other than the site(s) they propose. Award shall be subject to the timely completion of negotiations between the Agency and the selected applicants and a determination of both applicant responsibility and administrative capability.

Question: When will you select the organizations to be included in the Hub?

Answer: Selections will begin in Fall of 2015 and will be conducted in phases based on site and service type.

Question: Will preference be given to any organizations or services?

Answer: Preference will be given to organizations that provide those services listed in the RFEI.

Question: Will applications with green initiatives built into them receive preference?

Answer: DOHMH will not be giving preference to applications with green initiatives built into them.

Building and Space Questions

Question: Will DOHMH manage the building or will contract awardee be responsible for managing the facility?

Answer: DOHMH will manage the building.

Question: Do the DOHMH buildings, or Hub spaces, have any "green" initiatives associated with them in regards to HVAC? Are there city agencies, departments or initiatives that would be willing to explore partnering around a "green" application?

Answer: The buildings don't currently have green initiatives associated with them but we are willing to explore partnerships around this.

Question: Will the district buildings where the Hubs will be located fall under the purview of the Human Resources Administration?

Answer: No, these are DOHMH buildings.



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Question: How much square footage is available for each site, and will it vary by site? Is there any information on what percentage of the space lends itself to medical examination rooms, conference room space, therapy rooms, registration area, etc. or a description of what the space is currently utilized for?

Answer: We are in the process of determining square footage available for each site. Each site varies in the amount and type of square footage available.

Question: Are organizations responsible for their own cleaning services?

Answer: No.

Question: Are sites ADA accessible?

Answer: All Hub buildings have ADA ramps, entrances, and elevators. However, the East Harlem, Brownsville, and Bushwick buildings are not yet considered fully ADA compliant because they do not have ADA bathrooms. We have plans to add/convert some bathrooms in those three buildings for ADA compliance under our capital plan within the next 12-18 months. There are some additional top floor spaces in two of the Hub buildings (East Harlem and Tremont) which are not currently ADA accessible. They are not being offered for occupancy at this time.

Question: Will organizations be able to provide weekend services if selected?

Answer: Yes, but these organizations will be required to pay any additional operating costs associated with keeping the building open beyond regular business hours.

Question: Will organizations be given time to raise funds for any capital improvements required?

Answer: Yes, and we will negotiate the move-in timeline.

Question: Will DOHMH expedite the review process for capital improvements?

Answer: DOHMH will commit to expediting the review process, however, the Department of Buildings has their own process. We will work closely with DOB to ensure they know about the initiative.

Question: How much time will organizations have to renovate the space from the time they are selected until they time they need to move in?

Answer: We will negotiate the timeline based on services provided.

Question: Why is Old Broadway not being included as a potential site for health hubs?

Answer: There is no space currently available in that building.

Question: What are traditional operating hours?

Answer: Monday – Friday, 9 AM – 5 PM

Question: Will floor schematics be made available?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Is it possible to use space in more than one location and part time?

Answer: We will take this into consideration. Please note this on your application.



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Question: Will there be a space for parents and their babies to meet where they can learn how to engage with them?

Answer: We will take this into consideration. Please put on your application if this is a service you provide.

Question: Is there kitchen space to hold nutrition and cooking classes? If there is no space, can one be built if capital funding is available?

Answer: We will take this into consideration. Please put on your application if this is a service you provide.

Question: What are the sites in Brooklyn?

Answer: Bedford Health Center, 485 Throop Avenue; Bushwick Health Center, 335 Central Avenue; Brownsville Health Center, 259 Bristol Street.

Question: Are Hubs being considered or developed in Queens or Staten Island?

Answer: Currently, we do not have space available through this process in Queens or Staten Island.

Question: Will we apply for square foot space or will it be assigned?

Answer: Organizations will not apply for a specific space.

Question: Will Hub organizations have access to meeting spaces, theaters, or other community organizations' spaces?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Will there be space available at the Bronx locations for storage?

Answer: There is very limited storage available.

Partnership and Community Engagement Questions

Question: Who will be responsible for conducting the community needs assessment?

Answer: A number of community needs assessments have already been conducted in the Hub neighborhoods. DOHMH will work with partners to determine what additional assessments are needed.

Question: What does the community planning process consist of?

Answer: DOHMH is in the process of defining the community planning process. We will involve community partners in the Hub neighborhoods to identify shared goals and priorities.

Question: How much and what type of staff time will be required of partners in the Hub?

Answer: Staff time will be determined in a participatory process with building occupants. The guidelines of the participation, including staff time, will be determined by partners in a participatory process.

Question: Will you be providing a list of attendees for purposes of possible collaboration/proposal submission?

Answer: Yes, a list of attendees and a list of groups that downloaded the RFEI is included in this addendum. DOHMH is requesting that each individual organization submit their own Expression of Interest.



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Question: Are the Hub sites currently occupied by partners that applicants will propose to work with?

Answer: Some Hubs are currently occupied by community partners and DOHMH staff. The application process will not ask applicants to propose to work with these partners, but selected organizations will be expected to work with partners in the Hub and in the community in the joint planning process.

Question: Can applicants propose to collaborate and respond to this initiative with other providers or organizations? Will the full application require that we have partners in place already that we'd like to share space with?

Answer: DOHMH is requesting that each individual organization submit their own Expression of Interest. If DOHMH receives any Expressions of Interest that indicate the names of more than one entity, DOHMH will ask those organizations to submit separate Expressions of Interest.

Question: How will community members, groups, councils, and community boards be involved in the Hub planning process and in deciding what services will be available?

Answer: We understand, respect, and appreciate the work that has been done by various community groups, councils, and community boards who have helped lay the foundation for health planning in the Hub neighborhoods. We intend to work with these groups to identify the best roles they can play in the Hub planning process.

Financial Questions

Question: Is there a timeline for how long this program will last or be funded?

Answer: DOHMH is not funding this program. Partners will pay operating costs.

Question: Will DSRIP capital funds be an eligible source of support for associated Hub renovations?

Answer: The question about DSRIP capital funds would need to be directed to NYS Department of Health <http://www.health.ny.gov/>.

Question: Will community-based organizations be expected to pay rent for the space or to repay capital funding grants?

Answer: Community-based organizations will be expected to cover operating costs, not rent. DOHMH is not giving capital funding grants for the Hubs. For questions related to the Mayor's Primary Care Expansion initiative, please email primarycarequestions@cityhall.nyc.gov

Question: Will non-profit organizations be required to pay property taxes?

Answer: Partners will not have to pay property taxes.

Clinical Questions

Question: As an Article 28 center, would we be able to apply for Article 31 designation to offer co-located primary and behavioral health care?

Answer: This question should be directed to the NYS Department of Health <http://www.health.ny.gov/>.



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Question: Does each former DOHMH clinic site have a current Article 28 designation? Will Article 28/DTC organizations be able to operate under this, or will organizations be required to apply for individual Article 28 certification at each site?

Answer: Organizations will be required to apply for their own Article 28 certification at each site.

Question: Will organizations applying for the RFEI be allowed ample time to file the appropriate CON documentation to get appropriate licensure for services in the space? For example: If we apply to open a satellite Article 31 clinic in one of the sites, will we be given ample time to file the appropriate paperwork and get the clinic running with appropriate staffing?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Can you clarify whether the intent is for FQHCs to co-locate direct patient services in these buildings or rather co-locate staff that work around population health and community integration to facilitate coordination of efforts?

Answer: DOHMH is open to both. There will be some direct patient services in all buildings, but clinical partners will also be expected to devote staff time to neighborhood planning around population health.

Contractual Questions

Question: Will one organization be awarded the building contract or will each co-located service have its own contract with DOHMH?

Answer: Each provider will have their own operating agreement.

Question: What will the lease terms be?

Answer: Partners will not have leases. Operating agreement terms will be included in the application.

Mayor's Primary Care Expansion Program Questions

Question: Is the Mayor's Primary Care Expansion initiative potentially a source of support for necessary capital renovations for Hub sites?

Answer: Yes.

Question: If you do not get space in the Hub can you still apply for the Mayor's Primary Care Expansion initiative?

Answer: Yes

Question: What are the capital funds for the Mayor's Primary Care Expansion initiative available for?

Answer: Capital funds are being administered through a separate program and application process that is still in development. The program will likely include:

- Short-term working capital grants for new clinic start-up capital
- Technical assistance and predevelopment grants for planning new clinic site capital projects
- Credit support for capital construction, most likely to be in the form of City-arranged loan guaranties

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Question: Will the RFP for the Mayor's Primary Care Expansion initiative be timed so that we can use capital grants (if awarded) to make necessary repairs/renovations to the physical space?

Question: Will there be a streamlined process to receive approval on additional location waivers and LOS license extensions if approved?

Answer: DOHMH does not oversee licensing. Please refer to the NYS Department of Health <http://www.health.ny.gov/>.

Question: Which communities will this most benefit and would these sites expand to other at-risk neighborhoods beyond these pilot sites?

Answer: These are the neighborhoods where we have space available at this time.

Question: Is the goal to provide a one stop service shop?

Answer: The goal is community health planning, not just service provision.

Question: Will organizations have access to low-cost or government-based insurance companies?

Answer: No.

Question: Where can I download the Request for Expression of Interest form?

Answer: You can download the RFEI and the Expression of Interest form from DOHMH's website. Follow the links for contracting. If you have any trouble locating the application, please email us at expressionofinterest@health.nyc.gov

Question: If we submitted the Expression of Interest, should we have received notification that it was received?

Answer: You should have received an automatic response from the Expression of Interest email address. If you did not, please resubmit.

Question: Is DOHMH planning to issue a concept paper request as a prelude to an RFP.

Answer: No.

Question: What are the other services provided in the former DOHMH clinic buildings, and who are the providers of these services?

Answer: There are various DOHMH and partner services in these buildings. More details will be available at the Open Houses.

Question: Will the PowerPoint presentation be available online or emailed for review and discussion with organizations interested in applying?

Answer: The PowerPoint is attached.



Question: How will the program be evaluated, and what will we be expected to report on to fulfill the evaluation?
