WHITE: Thank you again for 14 joining us. And before we get to the 15 panel, and before we get to the questions, 16 we just want to review some important 17 information, some important dates regarding this RFP. 18 19 The due date for this RFP is 20 January 17th, 2019. The proposals are due 21 to be submitted in the HHS Accelerator 22 System by 2:00 p.m., again on 23 January 17th, 2019. 2.4 Proposals must be submitted in 25 the HHS Accelerator System. In order to

respond to this RFP you first must be pre-qualified in the HHS Accelerator System. DYCD will not be accepting any hard copies of these proposals.

We anticipate that award announcements will be made sometime early spring of 2019. The notifications of awards will be made through the HHS Accelerator System.

Anticipated contract term for this award is May 1st, 2019 through

June 30th, 2022, with an option for DYCD to renew for up to three additional years.

After this conference if you have any additional questions you may submit your questions in writing to RFPquestions@dycd.nyc.gov. Please be sure to indicate "Horizon RFP" in the subject line.

Also note, in order to ensure timely responses all questions must be received no later than January 10th, 2019.

How many of you here are familiar and pre-qualified with the HHS Accelerator

5 1 Proceedings 2 System? 3 (Indication from audience.) MS. WHITE: Great, that's the 4 5 majority of you. 6 So we want to ensure that at the 7 sign-in table you received a handout with the HHS Accelerator? Great. 8 9 And just to review for most of you and for some who do not know, the HHS 10 11 Accelerator System was launched to 12 simplify and improve the competitive 13 contract process for Health and Human 14 Service providers. 15 Agencies publish all requests for 16 proposal, RFP, documents in the HHS 17 Accelerator System. 18 Pre-qualified providers approved 19 for relevant services are eligible to 20 propose and can submit proposals after the 21 RFPs are released. 22 Providers must submit proposals 23 through the HHS Accelerator System by the 2.4 proposal due date, which in this case is 25 January 17th, 2019 at 2:00 p.m.

Now on October 5th of last year, 2018, DYCD released the Horizon Program Concept Paper, and we would just like to highlight some items that we've incorporated into the RFP based on the feedback we received.

Cultural competence. We elaborated on the language on cultural competence in response to comments received, and to emphasize these points moved the expectation regarding expert staff to a separate paragraph.

Restorative justice. This was added to the list of required program content areas as a result of comments from several different organizations.

Program director qualifications,
we changed the proposed requirement from a
master's degree to a bachelor's degree.
Again, that's based on feedback that we
received.

Okay. So now I'd like to move along by welcoming Jeremy Syrop and he is going to do an overview of the program highlights in this RFP. Thank you.

MR. SYROP: Good afternoon. Once again, I am Jeremy Syrop, the Deputy
Director of Older and Vulnerable Youth
Programs for COMPASS DYCD.

I'd like to, again, welcome everybody to today's session where I will be bringing you through key programmatic components of the RFP to give greater clarity to the program model, to core requirements, and what is expected as we move forward.

So as you may have read in the actual RFP itself, this solicitation is for one single competition for one single contract of work to be located at the Horizon Juvenile Center on 560 Brook Avenue in the Bronx.

Though we will require full startup of on-site services on July 1st, 2019, the awarded program will be asked to

begin planning starting May 1st, 2019.

And anticipated funding for the startup period is \$99,167. And beginning

July 1st, 2019 through June 30th, 2022, \$595,000 annually.

So the purpose of the Horizon

Program is to engage all youth residing in
the facility in high quality, diverse
activities that are reflective of their
interests; build on their strengths and
expose youth to new relationships.

The RFP outlines a program that is staffed by credible messengers; culturally responsive experts who can help assist young people in gaining tangible skills, expose them to restorative practices and overall enrich their experiences and knowledge as justice-involved youth.

As we will further explain, the program must allocate 35 to 50 percent of its budget to subcontractors and consultants, enroll and serve all available youth, provide transitional

services and collaborate with all on- and off-site partners.

As you can see here, our main program features as just explained.

So the target population for this program is all youth who reside in the Horizon Juvenile Center, this includes youth aged anywhere between 16 to 21 years old.

It is anticipated that on average 85 youth will be available for programming on a daily basis. It is the expectation for the contractor to serve all available youth on the days the program operates.

And when we say "all available youth," we're referring to the number of youth in the facility who are available for programming and not occupied in other mandated responsibilities such as court appearances, visits, so on.

Additionally, this program is expected to serve approximately 712 unique participants annually.

So the program must operate for

at least 645 hours over a minimum of 43 weeks. Programming must include weekdays, weekends and the summer.

For the school year, the program must operate on at least three afternoons during each week, at a minimum of nine hours per week.

For weekends, the program must operate at least three hours on Saturday and three hours on Sunday. An addendum will likely be released to clarify that particular breakdown.

Over the summer, the program must operate at least 105 hours over the course of seven weeks including weekends.

Also important to note is that hours are clock hours, meaning that if a program has ten activities scheduled between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m., only three hours will be accumulated toward the 645 total.

So moving on to staffing.

Administrative staff. The RFP calls for

-- requires a program director who is

required to have a bachelor's degree at minimum, at minimum five years of experience working with justice-involved youth, and this particular individual must be full-time.

We are also requiring an assistant program director. And like the program director, must have a bachelor's degree, three years of experience working with the justice-involved youth. This individual can be part-time or full-time.

There is also a master's degree in social work requirement. So either the program director or assistant program director is required to have an MSW. This individual will use their expertise to inform programming and collaborate with other clinical health professionals on site.

Continuing on staff. One of the most important components of the program will be efficient frontline staff members and creditable messengers.

So subcontractors and consultants

must consist of 35 to 50 percent of the annual budget. These individuals or organizations are to serve as expert and knowledgeable activity specialists who plan and lead program activities with ample experience in delivering instructions to the target population.

Staff must include credible messengers. These are individuals that share backgrounds and/or life experiences comparable to enrolled youth, helping to serve as empathetic yet robust role models who can offer transformative relationships to young people.

Staff should also be culturally responsive to the identities, needs and circumstances of young people, both understanding of participants developmentally and socially, while also being responsive to their unique needs as justice-involved youth.

Staff must also adopt trauma-informed approaches in their interactions with youth to take account of

psychological factors impacting them, including separation from family, friends and other traumas.

Scheduling and logistics. Having a well thought out and organized schedule will be important in filling out the various scheduling forms in the proposal.

Activities must be offered simultaneously and in multiple locations both in residential halls and in multipurpose spaces to serve all available youth.

Please estimate that up to ten separate groups may need to be served in one program day in up to ten separate locations. So this could be accomplished in multiple ways, including providing programming to five groups during the first half of the afternoon and the remaining groups would receive services for the second half of the afternoon.

Just as an example.

Activity design must also take into account the high turnover of

participants, some of who may be there for days while others for months.

And as mentioned earlier, the four required content areas are enrichment, life skills slash leadership development, career pathways and restorative justice.

It will be important for the proposed program design to ensure that all participants are regularly exposed to activities in these four areas.

Restorative justice, being one of the newly required areas, refers to activities that creatively get youth to think about responsibility; what it means to make amends through dialogue; group projects, these are your peace circles, mediation and violence prevention workshops just to name a few.

Career pathways and other
emphasis of this RFP refers to
opportunities that help prepare youth for
post-departure career options including
internships, job-readiness trainings,

3	Enrichment includes your music,	
4	your videography, agricultural, dance,	
5	robotics, and other specialty activities.	
6	And life skills. Leadership	
7	development activities help develop both	
8	competency and leadership including

11	So lastly, collaboration will be	
12	a key component for successful and smooth	
13	program operations. So the contractor	
14	will be expected to work effectively to	
15	maintain positive relations with all

18	So regular communications and	
19	meetings with DYCD, with ACS and other	
20	staff will be essential.	
21	And I'll pass it back to Zenaida.	
22	MS. WHITE: Thank you.	
23	So continuing on, we would like	
24	to review some important post-award

Assistance Hiring Commitment Rider. You should have received an FAQ sheet coming in and that gives you some information regarding the Public Assistance Hiring Commitment Rider.

Responsibility determination.

Please be advised that it is a requirements for all contractors to be determined responsible in the post-award phase; therefore, please make sure your passport disclosures are up to date; ensure that your New York State charities filings are current; and ensure that any outstanding liens or adverse information has been resolved. Unresolved issues often cause significant delays in the post-award process.

Notice for proposer subcontractor compliance. As outlined and stated in this RFP, total value of all subcontracts must be equal to at least 35 percent but no less -- I'm sorry, no less than 35 percent -- I'm sorry.

Total value of all subcontractors

DYCD will not be able to proceed with processing an awarded contract until it has obtained proof of the necessary insurance coverage.

And lastly, again, DYCD encourages MWBE participation and recommends the utilization of certified MWBEs, we put that twice 'cause that's how important it is. We want to make sure you make note of that.

And also, importantly, the transcript, presentation and attendance rosters will be posted to the DYCD website for your viewing.

So now we get to the segment that I believe you've all been waiting for, and that's the opportunity to ask your questions. The panel has made themselves available to provide you with the best answers possible.

MS. NOBLET: Carol Noblet from Getting Out & Staying Out, a reentry program.

We were thinking of including as a subcontractor the Cure Violence
Organization that is operative in the East Harlem area. So it is not technically its own 501(c)(3), but has a lot of cultural competencies and so on that we'd like to depend on.

Would that be allowed as a subcontractor?

MR. SYROP: We actually are not going to speak to, and cannot speak to, whether particular subcontractors would be allowed or disallowed.

Organizations, whether they are 501(c)(3)s or not, may be able to serve as subcontractors. So in your proposal if you are proposing, that would be something that you would explain.

MS. NOBLET: Okay. So it can be a 501(c)(3) or some nonprofit and we could also perhaps include for-profit

organizations that are --

MR. SYROP: The subcontractor, as DYCD defines subcontractors as of current, is inclusive to both for-profit and not-for-profit organizations. But they would need to be approved through the New York City Payee Information Portal and go through the proper approvals through the city before any approval can be officially given.

MS. NOBLET: So -- but that isn't exactly the HHS Accelerator; in other words, I have used that system and I know about pre-qualification for us. The others don't have to submit all that, they just have to be vetted separately?

MS. CANTELMI: So with the new human service contract, subcontractors that are receiving over \$20,000 in city funding have to be pre-qualified in the Accelerator system.

So if you plan on subcontracting with a nonprofit or for-profit they have to be pre-qualified in the Accelerator if

MS. CLARKE: Hi. Candra Clarke, Exodus Transitional Community.

On page eight of the RFP, "the contractor would have at least three years of successful experience within the last five years delivering services similar to those described in RFP."

Does that mean we have to have experience serving youth within a facility or if we work for a reentry program on the outside is that similar enough?

MR. FRENZEL-BERRA: We mean experience serving justice-involved youth. But having said that, the closer your experience is to the kind of services and the site that you're looking at here it would be better.

MS. CLARKE: Okay.

And then on page eleven when we talk about "the contractor would provide program services on at least three afternoons each week Monday through Friday."

The question is regarding the population to be served and the fact that the contractor will not control the number of individuals that are in the facility.

How are you thinking to handle that? Is there a possibility of adding population for the purpose of complying with the contractor as DYCD requires?

What are you planning to do regarding that?

MR. SYROP: The language utilized in the RFP is all available youth, right, so that is not a particular attendance metric, we are simply asking of the provider to serve those who are available.

So there's not a particular number that we are identifying. The RFP estimates that roughly 85 youth may need to be served on any given day, but in terms of what is expected, it's all available youth. It may be 85; it may be greater than 85; it may be less than 85.

MS. WHITE: If there are no more questions, I'm going to continue by
