
SPOTLIGHT NEWS

****DYCD Opens 45 New NYCHA Community Centers**

January marked the opening of 45 additional New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) Cornerstone programs funded by DYCD, joining the 25 already in place in all five boroughs. The expansion of community and senior center programming for residents in NYCHA housing was done in partnership with NYCHA and the NYC Department for the Aging (DFTA).

****DYCD Joins Hammel Community Center Gymnasium Re-opening**

On January 28, DYCD Assistant Commissioner Darryl Rattray and our Action Center Cornerstone program joined the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA), the NY/NJ Snowflake Youth Foundation, the NFL Super Bowl Host Committee, elected officials and community leaders to celebrate renovations to the Hammel Community Center Gymnasium in Rockaway Beach. Superstorm Sandy caused significant damage to the Center, rendering the gym unusable and closing it off to NYCHA residents and the local community. The completed repairs, which include new flooring, scoreboard, walls and basketball hoops, were funded through the Snowflake Foundation, the Mayor's Fund to Advance New York City and the Super Bowl Host Committee.



****DYCD Represents at Youth Action Day**

On January 28, Commissioner Chong traveled to Albany to participate in the Youth Action Day. Over 300 youth representing community-based organizations from across the city attended a rally and later lobbied legislators calling for an additional \$7.5 million in state support for the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) to ensure 3,700 slots are not lost due to the increase in the minimum wage.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Youth Service Improvement Grants (YSIG)

Grants are awarded in the spring and the fall. Awards are \$25,000. Applicants must: have 501(c)(3) tax-exemption, be a community-based organization, serve youth ages 5 to 25 years, serve youth directly (staff must have direct contact with youth at the point-of-service); and have an operating budget between \$250,000 and \$5.0 million. Deadline for applications is March 12, 2014 at 3:00pm Eastern time.

ING Unsung Heroes Awards Program

For more than 15 years, and with nearly \$4 million in awarded grants, ING Unsung Heroes has proven to be an A+ program with educators. Each year, 100 educators are selected to receive \$2,000 to help fund their innovative

class projects. Three of those are chosen to receive the top awards of an additional \$5,000, \$10,000 and \$25,000. Applicants must be: Employed by an accredited K-12 public or private school located in the United States; Full-time educators, teachers, principals, paraprofessionals, or classified staff with effective projects that improve student learning. World We Want Foundation is accepting applications from organizations that represent youth making positive social change in their communities and around the world. Eligible partner organizations must be recognized as tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, must have a project team of one or more youths, a partner organization that supports and sponsors the team, and a project mentor to guide and advise the team. Grants of up to \$5,000 will be awarded to youth between the ages of 13 and 25 who want to make a difference through a range of social action activities, including community service projects, service-learning projects, and social ventures. MINI-GRANTS

The **Kids In Need Foundation**, a national nonprofit organization dedicated to providing free school supplies to economically disadvantaged school children and underfunded teachers, is accepting applications from K-12 teachers for grants to support classroom projects. Grants of up to \$500 will be awarded to educators for projects that strengthen creativity, critical thinking skills, and/or core knowledge by engaging students in the learning process. Grant awards are based on the creativity of the projects being proposed. Typically, 300 to 600 grants are awarded each year. All certified K-12 teachers in the United States are eligible. Special Notice to Federal Grant Seekers: All Federal grant seekers must register their organization in the new System for Acquisition Management (SAM), which has replaced the Central Contractor Registry (CCR). If you are looking to apply for a Federal grant, double check your organization's record in SAM at <https://www.sam.gov/portal/public/SAM> to confirm that all of its information was correctly migrated into the new system. To register in SAM, you will need to have your organization's Dun & Bradstreet (DUNS) number. If you already have a DUNS number, the full registration process in SAM can take 3-5 days. If you don't have a DUNS number, you can obtain one at <http://fedgov.dnb.com/webform>. Assistance with the SAM system is available via the Federal Service Desk at www.fsd.gov or via phone at 866-606-8220 (toll free) or 334-206-7828 (internationally).
