The FFCMP pairs Firefighter candidates with experienced Firefighters who serve as their Mentors. The Mentees are provided with guidance during the Firefighter hiring process, and if they become Probationary Firefighters, throughout the Fire Academy.

As a Junior Mentor, Rodriguez along with other "Probies," participate in different Firefighter events to discuss their experiences with joining the Department.

"Getting this job is really tough and it is important to have someone who you can contact when you have questions," Rodriguez said. "My mentor Chris Myers was always calling me to check up on me and giving me helpful training advice, which helped me feel like I was a part of a family. Now it's my turn to help continue this tradition and do what I can to help other people get ready for this job."

The "Probie," who has also served as a U.S. Marine for 10 years, said he wants all future "Probies" to know that it is true when they hear that being a New York City Firefighter is the

best job in the world. In addition, he noted that all future "Probies" should remember that it takes "true dedication and discipline" to succeed in the Fire Academy.

"Getting through the Academy is all about hard work and you have to force yourself to stay focused, train, study, and really do what is required to get through it," he said, adding that he disconnected his cable during his 18-week training at the Fire Academy to help eliminate distractions from studying. "We trained at a very intense pace at the Fire Academy and it really requires a lot of discipline."

He also said he enjoys his new job, because it is one where he is continuously learning.

"I love my job and it has similarities to serving in military, which helped me transition into this new career," he said. "Not many people get to say they love their job, but I am one of them. I'm helping people and learning a lot."

Rodriguez, 31, is serving as one of New York's Bravest at Engine 307 in Queens. ■

# Did You Know That?

- There are 10,332 uniformed fire personnel members in the FDNY, which includes Firefighters and Fire Officers.
- The FDNY has 218 firehouses.
- FDNY Firefighters responded to 503,668 incidents in 2014, including 25,902 structural fires.
- Five hundred and twenty eight new FDNY Fire Recruits and 544 Fire Officers were trained at the Bureau of Training in 2014.
- FDNY Fire Officers and Firefighters conducted



92,827 inspections in 2014.

- Electrical, smoking, open flame (match, candle, etc.), careless cooking and appliances were the top five causes of accidental fires in New York City in 2014. ■

# Firefighter 101: Hydrants

The primary agent used by the FDNY to extinguish fires is water. The primary source of water for fire-fighting operations is hydrants. Engine companies carry water in booster tanks and they are capable of drafting water from static sources such as rivers or lakes.
