# 'Probie' Achieves 'Dream Deferred'

Ever since Probationary Firefighter Gary Boston was a child, he knew he wanted to be an FDNY firefighter. His uncle, retired FDNY Supervising Fire Marshal Fred Taylor, would often bring him to his firehouse, Engine 209 in Brooklyn to spend time with the firefighters there. Those experiences, Boston recalled, motivated him even more to join the New York City Fire Department.

“As a seven-year-old, my uncle taught me a lot about being a firefighter and I learned so much important information about the FDNY at such a young age,” he explained. “It has always been a dream of mine to work as an FDNY firefighter and really follow in my uncle’s footsteps.”

But his dream of becoming one of New York’s Bravest was attained later on in his life, since he pursued a career in financial services first. After earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in

finance from Howard University in 2006, Boston worked as an insurance underwriter for seven years. Still, even during that time, his desire to serve as a firefighter never wavered. In 2011, he decided to switch careers and follow his true calling. Since then, he said, he has never looked back.

To prepare for the Fire Academy, he noted that he trained five times a week, with cardio and weight lifting being a major part of his workout routine.

During most workout sessions, he said he ran four to five miles and each run was at a different pace.

He also credits the helpful advice from his mentor, Firefighter Aaron Gardner, as part of the reason why he succeeded in the Fire Academy. Whether it was in-person meetings or phone conversations, Boston emphasized that his mentor served as a great motivator and resource throughout the intense 18-week training. On December 5, 2013, Boston became one of 242 new graduates of the Fire Academy.

And now each time the 30-year-old wakes up and heads to Ladder 8 in New York City for work, he said, he is officially living out his dream.

- Electrical, smoking, open flame (match, candle, etc.), careless cooking and appliances were the top five causes of accidental fires in New York City in 2013.
