What to do if you think you have been a victim of deed fraud:

- Act quickly! Report fraud to the New York City Sheriff's Office immediately. Call (718) 707-2100.
- 2. Get a certified copy of the fraudulent document from the City Register's Office. Visit www.nyc.gov/acris.
- **3.** Report the crime to the district attorney's office in the borough where the property is located.
- **4.** Consult an attorney to confirm your ownership of the property.




Prevent deed fraud



Deed fraud is a serious crime that could result in you losing your home.





Criminals prey on unsuspecting homeowners to illegally transfer property deeds.

Anyone can be a victim, but seniors, immigrants, and people of color are at greatest risk.

Tips to prevent deed fraud:

- Open your mail from the Department of Finance. We will send you a notice when someone records a document on your property.
- Make sure we have your correct mailing address. Visit www.nyc.gov/ changemailingaddress.
- Check the City Register's records at www.nyc.gov/acris at least once a year to make sure that no deeds or mortgages have been recorded on your property without your consent.*
- Visit www.nyc.gov/deedfraud to learn more about deed fraud.
- Make sure you have a will that clearly states who should inherit your property.
