**Statement of Audit Procedure
CONSENT TO STATISTICAL AUDIT SAMPLING METHOD**

The Commissioner of Finance and undersigned Company Representative agree as follows:

1. The computer files related to the following issues and supporting invoices for the _____ Tax for the period(s) _____ through _____ are available for audit:
2. The Commissioner of Finance enters into this agreement on the assumption that the Company's books and records related to the issues described in paragraph 1, including computer files, are complete and adequate. If the Department of Finance determines that the books and records, including computer files, are not complete and adequate, the Department of Finance retains the right to withdraw from this agreement.
3. The computer files described in paragraph 1 are to be audited using the statistical sampling audit method to select records for examination. The Company understands that a random sample (or several random samples drawn from different groupings) of the data and records will be analyzed and used to project additional tax liability or refund. The size of the sample(s) will be determined by generally accepted, standard methods that produce statistically valid results. A Department of Finance representative explained to the signatory (or the signatory's designee) for the Company under audit the statistical sampling audit method and how it will be used to project audit adjustments. The signatory understands the basis of the statistical sample audit method to be used.
4. This agreement allows the Department of Finance to use the statistical sampling method to project audit adjustments. The signatory understands that this consent precludes the protest of the use of this methodology, and that, specifically, the company waives its right to have each document related to the files described in paragraph 1 reviewed. This agreement does not, however, preclude the protest of the audit results on grounds such as the taxability of certain transactions or the proper application of the statistical sample methodology. This form is not intended as, nor should it be construed to be, a consent to audit findings.

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Statement of Audit Procedure METHODOLOGY FOR COMPUTER-ASSISTED STATISTICAL SAMPLE AUDITS

The Audit Division of the Department of Finance has developed procedures for the application of statistical sampling techniques for tax audits. The procedures used were developed to achieve more objective and reliable audits. The statistical sampling techniques used employ generally accepted, standard methodologies that produce statistically valid results. Both the taxpayer and the Audit Division may benefit from a computer-assisted statistical sampling audit.

Tax audits are conducted to establish the correct amount of tax liability or overpayment. In the case of large taxpayers with computerized records, this means reviewing numerous (sometimes hundreds of thousands) transactions. Agreement by the taxpayer to a statistical sampling audit permits the review to be made in the most cost-effective and timely manner. Additionally, the reliability of the statistical sampling audit allows the taxpayer and the Audit Division to be comfortable in accepting the audit findings.

Groups of tax transactions subject to audit usually have many transactions in certain ranges (for example, transactions of low dollar amounts), and fewer in other ranges (transactions of high dollar amounts). The Audit Division's computer programs will segregate the transactions into various categories (strata). Certain strata (those of the highest dollar amounts, for example) may be identified for 100% review. For each of the other strata, random samples of transactions are selected by referencing computer-generated random numbers used in the statistical sampling program.

The sample size for each stratum is based on the number of observations necessary for statistical validity. The actual sample size will be larger than the minimum necessary for statistical validity. In most cases, the sample sizes for each audit will be reviewed with the taxpayer.

The results of the statistical sample audit will meet the following Audit Division policy standard:

Based on a 95% Confidence Level, with a one-sided test, the Precision will be no greater than 25% of the total estimate.

Confidence Level refers to the reliability of the results of the statistical sample audit. This is generally expressed as a certain percentage, the most common being 90% or 95%. If an auditor states that he or she is 95% confident in a projection of the sample result, the auditor means that he or she would expect 19 samples out of 20 to be within the precision range.

Precision is a statement of how close the sample result should be to the actual result for a given confidence level if every item in the group of transactions were examined. If a sample resulted in an adjustment of \$500 (either upward or downward) with a precision of \$75 (i.e. \$500, plus or minus \$75) at a given confidence level, the actual adjustment at a given confidence level would be within \$75 of the \$500, either

above or below. Thus, the adjustment could range from \$425 to \$575.

The policy of the Audit Division is to make adjustments based on the lower limit of the precision range. For example, if the results indicate a positive adjustment of \$500 plus or minus \$75, the proposed adjustment would be \$425. If the results of the sample indicate a negative adjustment of \$500 plus or minus \$75, the proposed adjustment would be \$425.

Once the review of the transactions selected by the random sampling has been completed, the average of all adjustments found in the sample for that stratum are projected against the total number of items for that stratum. The total upward or downward adjustment for a stratum is computed by summing the individual differences for the transactions reviewed in that stratum, and dividing the sum by the number of transactions reviewed in that stratum. The resulting average difference per transaction is then multiplied by the total number of transactions in that stratum to yield the adjustment for that stratum. The total adjustment for all strata is then calculated by adding the adjustments for each stratum.

Variations in the application of the above procedures may be determined on a case-by-case basis.
