CAMBA	Jewish Board of Children & Family Services	Parents of Young Children	<p>CAMBA is a multi-service organization located throughout the five boroughs serving 45,000 individuals annually through an integrated set of six program areas: Economic Development, Education and Youth Development, Family Support, Health, Housing, and Legal Services. The Jewish Board of Family and Children’s Services (The Jewish Board) helps New Yorkers realize their potential and live as independently as possible, promoting resilience and recovery by addressing various aspects of an individual’s life including but not limited to mental and physical health, family, housing, employment and education.</p> <p>For C2C, CAMBA will seek to integrate mental health services into its newest family shelter—The Landing, located in East Elmhurst, Queens. The Jewish Board will train CAMBA’s staff at The Landing in the C2C modalities and hire a full-time clinical coordinator on-site to oversee the project. CAMBA will also build a robust mental health referral system with the Jewish Board for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>
Safe Horizon	Safe Horizon Counseling Center	Parents of Young Children	<p>Safe Horizon is the largest non-profit victim services agency in the United States working with survivors of domestic violence, child abuse, sexual assault and human trafficking to move from crisis to confidence.</p> <p>For C2C, Safe Horizon’s counseling center will provide training to all domestic violence shelter staff across New York City in the C2C modalities. Safe Horizon will also work to strengthen mental health referrals between domestic violence shelters and the counseling center for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

Committee for Hispanic Children & Families	Comunilife	Parents of Young Children & Unemployed/Under employed Adults	<p>The Committee for Hispanic Children and Families (CHCF) combines education and advocacy to expand opportunities for children and families, and strengthen the voice of the Latino community. Comunilife is a community-based health and housing service provider whose service model uses a Multicultural Relational Approach for Diverse Populations framework, which integrates culturally appropriate information and sensitivity into all components of programming.</p> <p>For C2C, Comunilife will provide training to CHCF’s early care and education staff across multiple locations in the Bronx in the C2C modalities. CHCF will also build a robust mental health referral system with Comunilife for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>
Hudson Guild	Hudson Guild Paula Balser	Parents of Young Children	Hudson Guild is a multi-service community agency serving individuals who live, work, or go to school in Chelsea and other neighborhoods on Manhattan’s West Side, with a focus on those in need

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	Counseling Center		<p>of [<i>specify need</i>] and those residing in NYCHA complexes.</p> <p>For C2C, Hudson Guild’s Paula Balser Counseling Center will provide training to early childhood center teachers, teaching assistants, and Family Workers across multiple sites in Chelsea, Hell’s Kitchen, and Lincoln Square. All staff will be trained in the C2C modalities, with a particular focus on Family Workers who provide case management for families with children enrolled in early childhood educational services. Hudson Guild will also strengthen mental health referrals between early childhood centers and the counseling center for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided at the early childhood centers.</p>
Sheltering Arms Children & Family Services	Safe Space	Parents of Young Children	<p>Sheltering Arms’ mission is to strengthen the education, wellbeing, and development of vulnerable children, youth, and families across the New York metro area so that every individual has the support and opportunity needed to maximize their potential. Safe Space operates three fully-integrated Family Resource Center “hub” locations, anchored within Jamaica, Far Rockaway, and Ozone Park. The agency offers a comprehensive roster of integrated programming designed to support families holistically. Sheltering Arms and Safe Space are in the final stages of a merger of the two organizations that will expand the breadth of their both organizations’ services. Both organizations will use this grant to support a more robust integration of mental health services into early childhood services at Sheltering Arms.</p> <p>For C2C, Safe Space staff will train Sheltering Arms early childhood education center staff across six centers in Queens, the Bronx, and Manhattan in the C2C modalities. Through C2C, Sheltering Arms will also build a robust referral system with Safe Space for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

Hetrick-Martin Institute	Mount Sinai Adolescent Health Center	Out of School, Out of Work Youth	<p>Since its founding, Hetrick-Martin Institute (HMI) has grown from a small, volunteer-led grassroots advocacy organization into a leading professional provider of social support and programming for at-risk lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or questioning (LGBTQ) youth. Mount Sinai Adolescent Health Center (MSAHC) delivers comprehensive, integrated medical and mental health services and prevention education to young people aged 10 to 22.</p> <p>Through C2C, MSAHC will train HMI staff across their Job Readiness, Academic Enrichment, High School Equivalency, College Prep, Health & Wellness, and Arts and Culture programs in the C2C modalities. MSAHC will also train HMI’s homeless outreach staff to reach LGBTQ homeless youth with mental health needs who may not be engaged in HMI’s on-site programming. HMI will also build a robust mental health referral system with MSAHC for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>
Red Hook	NYU	Out of School, Out	Red Hook Initiative (RHI) is structured around a Youth Empowerment Pipeline, which promotes

The NYU Lutheran Family Health Centers (LFHC) network provides high quality, affordable outpatient primary health care and support services.</p> <p>Through C2C, LFHC will train RHI’s youth development staff in the C2C modalities and embed a part-time social worker to provide ongoing support to staff and one-on-one counseling to clients on-site as needed. RHI will also hire an additional social worker to work with C2C clients. Additionally, RHI will build a robust mental health referral system with LFHC for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site. Through this project LFHC will also support RHI in an application to become a licensed Article 31 mental health clinic.</p>
The Door	University Settlement	Out of School, Out of Work Youth	<p>The Door’s mission is to empower young people to reach their potential by providing comprehensive youth development services in a diverse and caring environment. University Settlement engages New York City residents through its network of services, which span 30 sites throughout Manhattan and Brooklyn in key program areas including early childhood education, youth development, eviction prevention, literacy, arts, older adults, and robust mental health programs.</p> <p>Through C2C, University Settlement will train The Door’s youth development staff at its Broome Street headquarters and the Bronx Youth Center in the C2C modalities, focusing on The Door’s Runaway and Homeless Youth, Supportive Housing, and Career and Education programs. The Door will also use C2C as an opportunity to strengthen existing referral protocols with University Settlement.</p>

Bedford Stuyvesant Restoration Corporation	Brooklyn Community Services	Unemployed/Under employed Adults	<p>Bedford Stuyvesant Restoration Corporation (BSRC), the nation’s first community development corporation, partners with residents and business to improve the quality of life in Central Brooklyn by fostering economic self-sufficiency; creating healthy, stable families; promoting the arts and culture; and transforming the neighborhood into a safe, vibrant place to live, work and visit. Brooklyn Community Services (BCS) helps children reach their potential, families become stronger, and adults lead productive, fulfilling lives by offering a diverse array of social services including vocational training and job placement; social support and mental health services for persons with disabilities; and child welfare and family support services such as foster care prevention, and group and family day care services.</p> <p>Through C2C, BCS will train BSRC staff at BSRC’s Restoration Plaza and Economic Solutions centers in the C2C modalities and embed a part-time social worker to supervise the implementation of the modalities and provide one-on-one counseling for clients on-site as needed. Both BSRC locations offer employment and economic empowerment services to Bed-Stuy residents, including a specific focus on NYCHA residents. BSRC will also build a robust mental health referral system with BCS for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

The mission of CASES is to increase public safety through innovative services that reduce crime and incarceration, improve behavioral health, promote recovery and rehabilitation, and create opportunities for success in the community.</p> <p>Through C2C, CASES will train CEO front-line employment and managerial staff in the C2C modalities and embed a part-time social worker at CEO to oversee the implementation of the modalities and provide one-on-one counseling services to clients as needed. CEO will also build a robust mental health referral system with CASES for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

NMIC works to empower the communities’ poorest residents through education, training, organizing, and support services. The Dean Hope Center for Educational and Psychological Services (DHCEPS) is an integral part of the teaching and training programs at Teachers College, Columbia University. Simultaneously, the DHCEPS offers affordable psychological and educational services to individuals, couples, and families residing in nearby neighborhoods in upper Manhattan.</p> <p>Through C2C, DHCEPS will train NMIC’s Adult Education & Workforce Development staff in the C2C modalities in both English and Spanish in order to provide culturally and linguistically competent mental health services. DHCEPS will also embed graduate students at NMIC to provide one-on-one counseling as needed. NMIC will also build a robust mental health referral system with DHCEPS for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

STRIVE will also build a robust mental health referral system with Union Settlement for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

AAANY will also hire a full-time bilingual LMSW to sit at AAANY to provide one-on-one counseling to clients that will be supervised by a clinical supervisor at LFHC. AAANY will also build a robust mental health referral system with LFHC for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>

Catholic Charities of Brooklyn & Queens currently sponsor over 160 programs and services for children, youth, adults, seniors, persons with developmental disabilities, individuals mental illness, and the isolated.</p> <p>Through C2C, Catholic Charities will train Voces Latinas front-line and managerial staff, as well as community outreach volunteers (“Promotoras”) in the C2C modalities in both English and Spanish in order to provide culturally and linguistically competent mental health care for the Western Queens Latina immigrant community. Voces Latinas will also hire full-time bilingual counselor to provide one-on-one counseling to clients and will assist in the coordination of C2C. Voces Latinas will also build a robust mental health referral system with Catholic Charities for individuals in need of more intensive mental health care than can be provided on-site.</p>
