Re: Central Park. City Parks Foundation's plans to upgrade the Summer Stage venue in Central Park.

The following facts and concerns were taken into account in arriving at our conclusions:

The City Parks Foundation, a nonprofit organization, brings hundreds of live music, dance and theater performances to communities throughout New York City. The most prominent event the Foundation produces is SummerStage, the city's largest free, outdoor performing arts festival, which features concerts presented on a temporary stage erected on Central Park's Rumsey Playfield, located to the east of East 72nd Street and the East Drive.

The Foundation has been working closely with the New York City Department of Parks on plans for needed upgrades to the SummerStage venue in Central Park. The stage is nearly 20 years old and can no longer hold the weight of some modern productions. SummerStage has had to turn down acts because their equipment was heavier than the current stage can safely bear. In addition, the safety and efficiency of the venue's electrical distribution system need to be improved.

To meet the goals of an improved stage and electrical system, the Foundation proposes to:

- Create six new stage foundations. (These foundations are below ground and covered in sand when not in use for SummerStage.)
- Replace the columns supporting the stage to increase weight-bearing capacity and present a smaller profile, increasing visibility for concertgoers.
- Dig new trenches and install access points for electrical wiring to reduce trip hazards and use electricity more efficiently.
- Build a new stage and canopy. Both the new canopy and new stage will be larger and the stage will be accessible for the first time.

All but the last change require the approval of the Public Design Commission. The stage and canopy are not permanently fixed in place, and are removed after the performance season.

The total cost of the upgrades will be \$5 million. Of this, \$2.9 million of public funds have already been allocated, including \$150,000 from Borough President Gale Brewer and \$50,000 from Council Member Helen Rosenthal. The remainder will be raised privately. Pending required approvals, the project will go out to bid in April and the upgrades will be in place in time for the 2019 performance season.
