Dear Nicole M.B. Rodriguez:

I am writing in response to your recent correspondence regarding the staffing levels and response times of the 9<sup>th</sup> Precinct and the 7<sup>th</sup> Precinct.

The Department appreciates your concern regarding this matter and we can assure you that decisions regarding personnel allocation are made fairly and equitably. The Department uses of both quantitative and qualitative measures to allocate personnel and every effort is made to deploy our resources in a manner consistent with the overall goal of reducing crime and improving the quality of life of all City residents. As a result of this process the 9<sup>th</sup> Precinct has a total uniformed staffing level of 152 personnel and the average time to respond to an emergency is 6.84 minutes. The 7<sup>th</sup> Precinct who would be responding to calls south of the Williamsburg Bridge has a total uniformed staffing level of 132 personnel and the average response time to an emergency call is 5.59 minutes.

While we would like to increase the number of police officers working in each precinct within the City, we must allocate personnel in keeping with available resources. Since 2001 the Department head count has declined by nearly 4,700 officers from our peak head count of nearly 41,000.

Even though we have experienced a decrease in uniformed staffing levels, the Department has utilized its limited resources to police more effectively. However, we are unable to predict future staffing needs of the Departments overall head count as far ahead as 2017.

Thank you for providing me with your concerns regarding this matter. We appreciate your continued support.
