Training Bureau Scholarship Unit

The mission of the Scholarship Unit is to develop educational opportunities for all members of the service by creating partnerships with colleges, universities, and other institutions. This coordination of resources is executed with the purpose of enhancing personal and career aspirations of members of the Department. Coordinating educational resources results in a more knowledgeable and professional workforce.

The Scholarship Unit seeks to enhance the Department's educational opportunities and provides counseling for members on how to proceed with their academic endeavors. The staff encourages uniformed and civilian members to take advantage of the numerous scholastic opportunities available and maintains literature on the various Departmental programs. The Scholarship Unit also hosts an annual college fair, each spring, providing members with an opportunity to interact directly with representatives from various institutions of higher learning. Whether you are an entry-level employee wishing to enhance your career potential or a tenured manager, a continued education provides an opportunity to enrich your career and is a worthwhile investment. In addition to enhancing your skills within the law enforcement field, pursuing higher education may provide an opportunity to explore alternative careers. Many of our uniformed and civilian members have pursued careers in medicine, teaching, government, and various other professions. In conjunction with the opportunities offered by the Department and the City of New York, various employee unions, religious, and fraternal organizations also offer educational opportunities.





Converting Police Academy Training to College Credits

If you want to further your education or meet promotional eligibility requirements, the educational credits earned, for training courses completed at the Police Academy, may be converted into college credits. If you are currently attending college, have your official Police Academy (PA) transcript (which may be requested from the Training Records Unit (20th Street Campus) 212-477-9750 forwarded to your school to be listed on your official transcript. Please note, some credits earned at the PA may not be accepted by the school, and most schools will not include your PA credits on their transcript unless you are an enrolled student.

Currently, sixty-four (64) college credits are required for promotion to sergeant. Ninety-six (96) credits are required for promotion to lieutenant, and a bachelor's degree is needed for promotion to captain. It is important to remember that these are minimal requirements. Many members enhance their career potential by pursuing advanced degrees (which may be accomplished through Department scholarship programs). The Educational Tracking Unit (ETU) monitors the eligibility of candidates for promotion. It also manages and updates the education records for all members of the Department.

Institutions such as Excelsior College, Frederick Community College and Thomas Edison College provide a service called "credit banking." Credit banking is a program that consolidates all of your past educational credits, test scores, and employment training records, earned from various sources, and puts them together on a single transcript (i.e. FEMA, Department of Corrections, Police Academy, and accredited professional training courses). Members of the service are advised to refer to Operations Order 13-2008 for further information on the "On-Line Education Profile Via the Intranet," and are urged to keep their On-line Education Profiles updated to avoid unnecessary delays with promotion eligibility in the future.

Military transcripts are also accepted by the Department's Educational Tracking Unit (ETU). These transcripts will only be accepted from official military branch personnel departments. Credit banking services for military credits is unnecessary, as the ETU accepts multiple transcripts from the various accredited schools attended.

Contact the Training Records Unit (212) 477-9750 to have the official transcript of all PA courses forwarded to the school or the credit banking service of your choice. Once the school has listed the education credits earned at the PA on their official transcript, have that official transcript forwarded directly to the Education Tracking Unit to update your records. - 1. Log onto the NYPD'S FINEST Intranet homepage
- 2. Select WORK
- 3. Locate the APPLICATIONS heading
- Click on the blue area beneath "Online Computer Systems to Help Get the Job Done" (this area will change color when touched by cursor)
- 5. Select PERSONNEL APPLICATIONS
- 6. Select "Education Tracking Login"
- First time users select "New visitors click here to register"
- Follow instructions listed (do not enter dashes in SS#)
- Use proper format for dates (mm/dd/yyyy-4 digit year)
- 10. For optimal results select an eight (8) character password formatted like the one indicated here (Abc12345) at least one capital letter, two lowercase letters and five (5) numbers

11. Upon navigating to the entry page, select the appropriate state and enter college attended, degree earned, major/minor, credits earned, date of graduation and military branch, if applicable. To complete your record update, have an official transcript forwarded to the ETU from a college, university or other accredited higher education institution (including the United States military branches) to the address indicated below.

Preparing For The Application Process

Preparing for the application process can be overwhelming. The following page provides a detailed explanation of how to master the process. If you have difficulties with the application process, the Scholarship Unit staff will be happy to assist.

Undergraduate Programs

Enrolling in a program of any type involves a process in which you are expected to complete a detailed application form and, in many instances, requires that you provide transcripts from schools previously attended. Once you have completed the application, you will need to report the number of credits that you received from other colleges, as a result of your Police Academy Recruit Training or In-Service Training to the school you are applying to.

The best advice for completing a college or university application is to have the institution's academic advisor review the application to ensure its accuracy. Additionally, most colleges require that you submit letters of recommendations from either former teachers or current employers. It is important that you make note of application deadlines, especially if you intend to apply for financial aid, which will require an additional set of applications.

The Training Records Unit will assist you in obtaining recruit school credits and in-service course credits by sending you a Transcript Request Application. The Transcript Request Application requires specific information such as appointment date, year of recruit school attendance, as well as the company number. In order for a college or university to accept recruit school credits, an official transcript generated by the Training Records Unit must be sent directly to the academic institution in which the member is currently enrolled. The institution will determine how many credits they will accept; and it should be noted that credits are not automatically granted for completed NYPD training programs. It is recommended that all individuals requesting recruit credits and/or credits for specific in-service courses and any other accredited courses taken in the Department call the Training Records Unit, located at the 20th Street Police Academy, Room 833 for an application. The Training Records Unit can be reached at 212-477-9750, forms are available on-line at www.nyc.gov/ html/nypd/ html/home/employees.shtml.

Graduate Programs

In addition to application forms, transcripts, and recommendations, many graduate programs require standardized test scores, such as the Graduate Record Examination (GRE), and the Law School Aptitude Test (LSAT), (see Appendix B, pg.65).

Most programs accept standardized test scores taken within five years from application date. Test scores in excess of five years will not be accepted. Each school will post its own deadline for submission of scores. Tests such as the GRE and LSAT consist of vocabulary tests, reading comprehension tests, analytical questions, writing samples, and some may include mathematics.

Preparing for the Application Process

There are many ways to prepare for these exams. Several continuing education programs in the City University of New York system offer preparatory classes, and there are also several privately run schools that specialize in this type of test preparation. If time or money is an issue, workbooks with sample tests and practice questions are available in bookstores. If you have access to the internet, there are several relatively inexpensive tutorial programs available on-line. Regardless of the method, taking the time to prepare will increase the probability of doing well. The sources are cited in Appendix B.

Continuing Education Programs

The application process for continuing education programs is generally easier. Since there are no degrees involved and the studies are less formal, students simply sign up for courses. Some of the more challenging certificate programs may require a formal application process; however, even these are less time-consuming than traditional, degree-granting programs. Registration is also a much faster process; and often students can register for courses a few weeks, or days before classes begin.

Scholarship Selection Process

The Department's Scholarship Selection Committee for the **Traditional Scholarship Program**, **FBI National Academy**, and the **Educational Leave Scholarship** is comprised of seven executives who vote on applicants based on the fulfillment of the program eligibility requirements, in conjunction with prior education and professional performance (i.e. applicant grade point average, Departmental Annual Performance evaluations, etc.) and the applicant's personal statement. The goal of the Department's formal scholarship selection process is to identify the most qualified scholarship recipient through the assessment of applicants by a fixed committee of seven top executives in the Department's hierarchy. Once the Selection Committee's ballots are tabulated, a scholarship recipient is identified.

The members of the NYPD Scholarship Selection Committee are: First Deputy Commissioner, Chief of Department, Deputy Commissioner, Training, Deputy Commissioner, Personnel, Deputy Commissioner, Strategic Initiatives, Deputy Commissioner, Equal Employment Opportunity, and Chief of Community Affairs.

The Scholarship Selection Committee for members requesting to attend the Center for Homeland Defense and Security Naval Postgraduate School (Master in Homeland Security Program and Executive Leaders Program) consists of the Deputy Commissioner, Training and the Chief of Counterterrorism. The Committee interviews the candidates who applied for consideration into the program and makes recommendations to the Police Commissioner.

Once the Police Commissioner approves the Committee's recommendations, the candidates are officially nominated to attend the Naval Postgraduate School by the Department on official letterhead. The Naval Postgraduate School will make the final selection of members admitted into their programs.

Preparing for the Application Process

Eligibility Guidelines For All Scholarships

- Applicants are required to have a minimum of three years of service in good standing and remain in good standing throughout the duration of the scholarship.
- With the exception of the Police Reserve Association grant, NYPD personnel are only eligible for one scholarship during the course of their service with the Department.
- Some scholarships require applicants to have taken the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) Test or the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) within the past five years.
- Recipients of a Department scholarship must agree in writing to remain in the Department for a minimum of two years subsequent to the completion of their final semester. Some scholarships require a longer service commitment subsequent to program completion.
- The Scholarship Committee will award each scholarship based on fulfillment of the eligibility requirements, in conjunction with prior educational and professional performance (i.e. applicant grade point average (GPA), Departmental Annual Performance Evaluations, etc.) and personal statement.
- A 3.0 grade point average (GPA) is preferred.

Selection and Award Criteria / Service Commitments

- Applicants must be accepted by the school offering the scholarship in accordance with their academic standards and application process. The Scholarship Committee makes the final determinations for all awards, except for CHDS Naval Post Graduate School, New York Law School, and St. John's School of Law. The school's Admissions Committee will determine scholarship recipients.
- Awardees must agree in writing to remain in the Department for two (2) years after their final semester of being awarded the Educational Leave Scholarship or New York University Scholarship.
- Awardees granted a paid leave of absence for the Harvard University, SUNY at Albany, Hunter College, or the Police Commissioner's Graduate Scholarship, must agree in writing to remain in the Department for four (4) years after final semester of award.
- Awardees granted a paid leave of absence for the FBI National Academy and CHDS Naval Postgraduate School must agree in writing to remain in the Department for three (3) years after final semester award.
- Awardees are required to supply an official sealed transcript upon completion of each school semester, and proof of enrollment for the following semester for continuation of scholarship. A UF49 must be submitted if awardees are declining their awards, or are unable to fulfill their educational commitments.

NYPD Traditional Scholarship Program

The following is a list of traditional scholarships available with their program descriptions, eligibilities and requirements. These scholarships become active in November and are announced via Department Bulletins and FINEST messages.

Undergraduate Programs

- Pace University (1 award per year)
- St. Joseph's College (1 award per year)

Graduate Programs

- Harvard Kennedy University (1 award per year)
- Hunter College (2 awards per year)
- New York Law School (1 award per year)
- New York University Wagner School of Public Service (1 award per year)
- Police Commissioner's Graduate Scholarship (1 award per year)
- Police Reserve Association Scholarship (3 awards per year)
- St. John's University School of Law (1 award per year)
- St. Joseph's College (1 award per year)
- State University of New York at Albany, School of Criminal Justice (2 awards per year)

Applicants are required to provide official sealed transcripts for high school or college requirements, and official score reports for standardized exams (i.e.GMAT, GRE, LSAT, etc.).

Note: Since the standardized test scores for the GMAT, GRE, LSAT, etc., require significant time for preparation, scheduling and scoring, applicants are advised to take required examinations at an early date (no later than December 31, of the current year). These scores must be available to the college and the scholarship award committee by the application deadlines. Appendix B lists GMAT, GRE, GRE-ETS and LSAT websites.



Undergraduate

Pace University

Award: Pace University offers one (1) full undergraduate scholarship each year, covering tuition costs. The cost of fees and books are paid by the recipient. Class attendance is strictly during off-duty time; no paid leave of absence will be granted. This scholarship can also be used for the iPace program.

Eligibility: Police Officer, Detective, and Sergeant. Candidates must have a positive service record, provide a letter of recommendation, and submit a written personal statement.

Academic requirements:

- Candidates must be a high school graduate with a total grade average of 85 or higher and a combined verbal and quantitative SAT score of 1100.
- A minimum 3.0 grade point average (GPA) from an accredited college or university is required.

Pace University offers a wide variety of programs in liberal arts, education, psychology, business (administration, marketing and accounting), computer information systems and programming, all leading to a bachelor's degree. Scholarship recipients may select the program of their choice.

Undergraduate

St. Joseph's College

Award: St. Joseph's College School of Professional and Graduate Studies offers one full undergraduate scholarship each academic year, covering tuition costs. The cost of fees and books are paid by the recipient.

Eligibility: Any full time employee of the New York City Police Department (uniformed or civilian), who has been accepted to St. Joseph's College School of Professional and Graduate Studies.

Academic requirements:

- A minimum 2.0 GPA from an accredited college or university; or a minimum 3.0 GPA from a recognized accredited college
 (www.apc-colleges.org) is required.
- Applicants must meet the general admission requirements of the school.
- A writing sample must be provided.

Eligible candidates may submit an admission's application online or in person at the Admissions Office to attend full or part-time. A wide variety of programs are available:

- Business Administration with a major in Accounting
- Computer Information Technology
- Criminal Justice
- General Studies

- Health Administration
- Hospitality/Tourism Management
- Human Services
- Marketing
- Medical Technology
- Nursing (RN required)
- Organizational Management (also online)

Note: Students may attend either the Brooklyn Campus or the Long Island Campus.



Graduate Program

Harvard Kennedy School

Award: The Harvard Kennedy School offers one (1) scholarship leading to a Master's Degree in Public Administration. The scholarship recipient will receive a ten and a half ($10 \frac{1}{2}$) month paid leave of absence. The student will pay expenses such as travel, room and board, tuition, fees, books, etc. However, the New York City Police Foundation provides a grant of \$15,000 to defray expenses.

Eligibility: Rank of Sergeant, Lieutenant, Captain, or managerial civilian with a minimum of seven years of service at the time of application. The recipient of the award must agree in writing to remain with the Department for four (4) years upon completion of the program.

Academic requirements:

- Applicants must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college/university by June of the year prior to entering the program, with a final grade point average (GPA) of 3.00 or higher.
- Candidates must have taken either the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) or the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT) within the last five years.

Note: Through the 2018-2019 academic year, the Harvard Club of New York Foundation is offering an annual \$50,000 funding opportunity to one member approved for Department scholarship. For additional information contact <u>foundation@HCNY.com</u>.

Graduate Program

Hunter College

Award: The Department will grant a twelve (12) month paid leave of absence for two (2) uniformed members of the Department to pursue a Master of Science Degree in Urban Affairs at Hunter College. Recipients will be required to pay full tuition and meet the same academic standards for admission as other applicants to the school.

Eligibility: Police Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant, or Captain with a minimum of three years Department service at time of application are eligible. Recipients of the award must agree, in writing, to remain with the Department for four (4) years upon completion of the program.

Academic requirements:

 A bachelor's degree with a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher from an accredited college/university is required.



Graduate Program

New York Law School

Award: New York Law School offers scholarships to uniformed members of the service for both the fulltime (three year) and part-time (four-year) JD Programs. Scholarship decisions are made by the admissions committee at the time admission is offered.

Eligibility: Candidates must be a uniformed member of the service with a minimum of three years service at time of application. A letter of recommendation from the candidate's immediate supervisor as well as a personal statement are also required.

Academic requirements:

- Candidate must gain admission to New York Law School.
- Candidates must have earned a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university with a grade point average placing candidate above the median law school's entering class. (Note: the median GPA currently stands at 3.17, however, this is subject to change).
- Candidates must have taken the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) within the past five years with a minimum score of 151.

Note: Determination of scholarship awards are made exclusively by the law school's admission committee board, upon several criteria, including but not limited to LSAT score and undergraduate GPA. The NYPD will provide a letter of recommendation.

Graduate Program

New York University - Robert F. Wagner Graduate School of Public Service

Award: One (1) scholarship is available on a yearly basis for two (2) public administration programs. One leads to a Master of Public Administration, the other leads to an Executive Master of Public Administration. The scholarship provides for partial tuition cost for both programs (paid by the NYC Police Foundation and NYU Wagner). Recipients of this scholarship will also be granted an Educational Leave Scholarship (subject to eligibility criteria on pg.17) for the duration of the program. The balance of tuition, fees, and cost of books will be the responsibility of the student. Class attendance is strictly during off-duty time.

Eligibility: Candidates for the Master of Public Administration are Police Officers and any higher rank or any civilian member of the service. Candidates should have a minimum of three years of positive service with the Department at time of application. The Executive Master of Public Administration is available to uniformed members with a minimum of five years of service and in the ranks of Sergeant, Lieutenant or Captain. Civilians in managerial titles, with a minimum of seven years of managerial experience, are also eligible.

Academic requirements:

 A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university with a final grade point average of 3.0 or higher is required.

Graduate Program

The Police Commissioner's Graduate Scholarship

This scholarship is to be applied towards a degree that is police related, or a governmental administration program, at any of the following graduate schools: Brown University, Columbia University, Harvard University, Georgetown University, New York University, Princeton University, University of Pennsylvania, and Yale University.

Award: One (1) scholarship will be provided to a uniformed member of the service consisting of a one-time grant of \$15,000. In addition, the scholarship will afford the applicant a ten and a half month (10 $\frac{1}{2}$) month paid leave of absence to earn their graduate degree.

Eligibility: Must be in the rank of Police Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant, and Captain. Applicants must have a minimum of seven years of service in good standing. The recipient of the award must agree in writing to remain with the Department for four (4) years upon completion of the program.

Academic requirements:

- Applicants must have earned a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university with a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher.
- Candidates must be a matriculated student in one of the universities listed.

Graduate Program

Police Reserve Association Scholarship

These grants are designed to encourage and support ranking members of the service to continue their education beyond the undergraduate level at accredited colleges/universities.

Award: The Police Reserve Association offers three (3) \$1,500 one-time scholarship awards to three (3) uniformed members of the service (UMOS). One will be in the honor of Chief Michael Markman.

Eligibility: Candidates must be a uniformed member of the service in the rank of Police Officer through Captain.

Academic Requirements:

- Candidates must be enrolled in a Graduate Program (Master's, Ph.D., JD, etc.) at an accredited institution.
- A minimum of six credits must be completed each semester.
- A grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher is required for initial eligibility.

Graduate Program

St. John's University - School of Law

Award: St. John's University School of Law offers a law enforcement scholarship for its evening program. Class attendance is strictly during off-duty time.

Eligibility: Candidates must be a uniformed member of the service with a minimum of three years of service at the time of application. A letter of recommendation from an immediate supervisor and a personal statement are also required.

Academic Requirements:

- A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university, with a final grade point average of 3.0 or higher is required.
- Candidates must have taken the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) within the past five years with a minimum score of 160.
- Applicants must gain acceptance by the school.

Note: Determination of scholarship awards are made exclusively by the law school's admission committee board, upon several criteria, including but not limited to LSAT score and undergraduate GPA. The NYPD will provide a letter of recommendation.

Graduate Program

St. Joseph's College

Award: St. Joseph's College School of Professional and Graduate Studies offers one (1) full graduate degree scholarship each academic year, covering tuition costs. The cost of fees and books are paid by the recipient.

Eligibility: Any full time employee of the New York City Police Department (uniformed or civilian), who has been accepted to St. Joseph's College School of Professional and Graduate Studies.

Academic requirements:

- Admission to one of St. Joseph's College School of Professional and Graduate Studies graduate degree programs
- Candidates must have an undergraduate GPA of 3.0 or better.
- The GMAT may be required for applicants NOT involved in supervision, program development, or specialized training.

St. Joseph's College School of Professional and Graduate Studies offer a wide variety of graduate degrees, which include:

- Master of Science in Human Services Leadership
- Master of Science in Management with concentrations in Organizational Management, Health Care Management, or Human Resources

Management

- Executive Master of Business Administration
- Master of Business Administration in Accounting
- Master of Business Administration in Health Care Management
- Master of Science with a Major in Nursing (BS/RN Required)
- Master of Arts in Literacy and Cognition
- Master of Arts in Mathematics Education (Long Island Campus only)

Note: Students may attend either the Brooklyn Campus or the Long Island Campus

DID YOU KNOW ...

Originally named St. Joseph's College for Women, the college was founded by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Brentwood, in response to the need for a day college for young women.

Graduate Program

State University of New York at Albany School of Criminal Justice

Award: The School of Criminal Justice of the State University of New York at Albany, in conjunction with the New York City Police Foundation, offers two (2) full tuition graduate scholarships leading to a Master Degree in Criminal Justice each year. This scholarship provides full tuition. Costs of fees, books, travel expenses, and room and board are to be paid by the student. A ten and a half month ($10 \frac{1}{2}$) paid leave of absence will be granted.

Eligibility: Candidates must be in the rank of Police Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant or Captain with a minimum of three years of service with the Department. A letter of recommendation from a supervisor, and a written personal statement are also required. The recipients of the award must agree in writing to remain with the Department for four (4) years upon completion of the program.

Academic requirements:

- A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university, with a final grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher is required.
- Candidates must have taken the Graduate Record Examination (GRE), with writing sample, within the last five years with verbal and quantitative GRE scores totaling a minimum of 285.



Educational Leave Scholarship Program

Award: The Department offers up to a total of twenty-four (24) Educational Leave Grants to members who are enrolled in postgraduate programs (one grant will be awarded annually to the recipient of the New York University Wagner School of Public Service Scholarship). The Department's Educational Leave Scholarship Program awards members annual paid educational leave grants of eighteen (18) days per academic year. Nine (9) days are awarded in each, the fall, and spring semesters. Educational leave days must be used during the semester awarded and may not be carried over to another semester.

Members may use educational leave days at their own discretion, with minimal limitations, to attend class, prepare for exams, or to participate in internships or other aspects of their academic development. Leave may be contingent upon the needs of the Department. Continuance of each award is dependent on the student maintaining enrollment in a graduate program, having a minimum GPA of 3.0, registering for and completing nine (9) graduate credits per semester, and submitting necessary documentation to the Scholarship Unit each semester in a timely manner.

Note: Restrictions apply regarding when the recipient of the award may take educational leave days. For complete details refer to Operations Order number 5-6 dated 2/13/98 and Personnel Bureau Memo number 2 dated 1/14/97. Copies are available upon request from the Scholarship Unit at 718-670-9412. Recipients of the Educational Leave grants must agree in writing to remain with the Department for two years after completion of the final semester of the award.

Eligibility: Candidates must be a uniformed member of the service in the rank of Police Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant, or Captain; or a civilian member of the service with an equivalent title. Applicants require a minimum of three years of service at time of application. A letter of recommendation from a supervisor and a personal statement are also required.

Academic requirements:

- Applicants must be a new or continuing student enrolled in a postgraduate (ie. Master's, Ph.D., and JD) program relevant to the Department's mission, at an accredited institution.
- A minimum of nine (9) credits must be completed per semester.
- Candidates must have a GPA of 3.0 or higher for initial eligibility and are required to maintain a GPA of 3.0 for continuation of award.
- Continuance of award is dependent on the fulfillment of program requirements and the submission of required documentation (official transcript, class registration, and updated Department evaluations) to the Scholarship Unit each semester.
- Educational leave days will be credited to the recipients leave bank after all required documentation is submitted and verified.

Center for Homeland Defense and Security (CHDS) Naval Postgraduate School (NPS): Master's Degree in Homeland Security

The eighteen (18) month CHDS on-line master's degree program is provided at no cost to state (including members of the National Guard under Title 32), local municipality, and U.S. Department of Homeland Security government employees (including the U.S. Coast Guard) accepted into the program.

Award: Designed to accommodate the busy schedules of today's leaders, the on-line program requires participants to be in-residence only two (2) weeks per quarter (for a total of 12 weeks on job time). All travel and tuition expenses are paid for eligible participants. Participants complete the remainder of their coursework via network-based distance learning methods. The following are minimum qualifications applicants should have to be considered for admission:

- Candidates must be employed full-time by a local, state or DHS federal government agency or the U.S. military, and have homeland security experience and responsibilities.
- An undergraduate degree from an accredited college or university is required.
- Applicants must have a minimum 3.0 grade point average (GPA) for all undergraduate coursework or awarded a graduate degree.

Applicants with a GPA below 3.0 will be considered if they have relevant work experience and qualifications to complement their academic record. It is strongly recommended that applicants with less than a 3.0 GPA take either the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) or the Miller's Analogies Test (MAT) and obtain a score that would place them in consideration for the program.

 If accepted to the program, the applicant plans to continue to serve in a homeland security capacity for at least two years following graduation.

In order to enhance the sharing of information across all disciplines associated with homeland security, the program enrolls military officers and federal officials who work in concert with local and state officials. NPS provides a unique and neutral learning environment for collaboration amongst the top homeland security leaders in the nation.



The curriculum is structured around the key policy and organizational design problems that future homeland security leaders are likely to confront, and provides them with the analytic skills they will need to meet those challenges. Each course in the curriculum requires students to master the cores issues, principles, and problem-solving approaches for the topic in question, and to apply those fundamentals to the specific challenges confronting their own jurisdictions. The courses are sequenced and integrated to strengthen the overall cohesion of the curriculum, and enhance its effectiveness as professional graduate-level education. Courses include:

- Introduction to Homeland Security
- The Unconventional Threat to Homeland Security
- Policy Analysis and Research Methodology
- Technology for Homeland Security
- Intelligence for Homeland Security: Organizational and Policy Challenges
- Critical Infrastructure: Vulnerability Analysis and Protection
- Special Topics in American Government for Homeland Security
- The Law and Homeland Security: A Multi-Disciplinary Approach
- Comparative Government for Homeland Security

- Strategic Planning and Budgeting for Homeland Security
- The Psychology of Fear Management and Terrorism
- Knowledge into Practice: A Homeland Security Capstone Course

The annual deadlines for on-line applications for the master's degree program are May 1st and December 1st each year (on-line applications are to be completed after the candidate is recommended by the Police Commissioner). The NPS makes the final selection of candidates admitted into the program.

Eligibility: Members of the service in the rank of Sergeant and above, civilian members in managerial titles, or Intelligence Research Analysts who meet the above requirements.

FBI National Academy

The FBI National Academy has long been a vital element in the continuing improvement of law enforcement standards, knowledge, and cooperation throughout the world. The National Academy experience provides a wide range of leadership and specialized training, as well as an opportunity for professional law enforcement officers to share ideas, techniques, and experiences during ten (10) weeks of courses that are accredited by the University of Virginia.

Award: Attendance to ten (10) weeks of classroom study during one of four sessions conducted annually at the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. There are sixteen (16) awards per year. Room and meals are provided by the Academy, but students are responsible for providing their own means of transportation.

Eligibility: Potential candidates must be uniformed members of the service in the rank of either Lieutenant or Captain. Applicants must be in excellent physical condition capable of vigorous physical activity and able to meet established FBI age requirements.

Note: A Department Bulletin will announce the commencement of the application period along with the Department guidelines for applying.

Only candidates selected by the Department to attend will be allowed to complete the on-line registration with the FBI Virtual Academy.

Professional Fellowship in Police Studies Fulbright Program with the United Kingdom

The United Kingdom Fulbright Commission in London offers professional fellowships in the field of Police Studies. The Fellowships are made available under the Fulbright program to enable active police officers and police administrators to expand their professional expertise and experience conducting research into an aspect or a problem of policing shared by police departments in the United States (U.S.) and the United Kingdom (U.K.). These fellowships are being made available under the Fulbright program to allow police professionals to broaden their professional perspective and contribute to greater U.K. / U.S. understanding. Applications are welcome from any applied area of domestic police work or police administration. Researchers or academics in criminal justice are not eligible for this professional award that is targeted for the practitioner.



Award: Candidates selected by the Fulbright Commission and approved by the Department will be granted paid leaves of absence to participate in these programs. The fellowship is for a period of three to four months. The starting date is to be arranged with the U.K. Fulbright Commission, but the grant must begin no earlier than September of the following year that the application is submitted, and completed by August of the next year. The award consists of a fixed sum grant of 5,000 British Pounds Sterling (travel inclusive), or approximately \$8,000 USC.

Eligibility: Applicants must be currently employed by a domestic police force, must be recommended by supervisory staff within their Department and hold a position of authority at the rank of Sergeant or above.

Academic requirements:

- Candidates holding a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, police studies or a related discipline in the social sciences are preferred.
- The fellowship is for professional development and the exchange of ideas with British counterparts. Applicants must develop a substantive project and demonstrate that participation in the program will produce benefits of significance to the larger law enforcement community.
- Candidates must supply information on possible hosts in order to be competitive.

 Successful candidates will arrange their own affiliation to a higher educational host institution appropriate to the research topic. A letter of invitation is not required at the time of application, but is advantageous. The proposed host institution should have links with the U.K. police forces.

Projects: Projects should be focused on issues pertaining to policing and should be of obvious potential worth to the applicants' home department in the U.S. and to the larger law enforcement community. Applicants are encouraged to consider the value of the chosen topic in relation to both home and host institutions, and to consider any legal issues that may be involved with the research (i.e., applicants should make certain the topic chosen is not one from which U.S. police are barred from participation).

Applicants should consider the feasibility of completing the proposed research in the time frame proposed. An important concern, also, is that the project be one that requires the candidate's presence in the U.K. to accomplish the research. If the work can be done in the U.S., there is no need to send the applicant to the U.K. Applicants are encouraged to consult with officers in the field about interest in and use of work proposed.

Applicants do not need to confirm an affiliation prior to submitting an application, but it is advantageous to have identified a few potential host institutions and/or to include a letter of invitation with the application. If the candidate is selected for an award, the U.K. Fulbright Commission will assist with affiliation. University programs are usually identified as police science, law enforcement, criminology, criminal justice, or corrections.

The following universities may offer relevant courses: Queen's University, Belfast; Brunel University; University of Cambridge; Cardiff University; Coventry University; University of Durham; University of Edinburgh; University of Keele; University of Kent at Canterbury; King's College, London; Kingston University; University of Leeds; Leicester University; University of Licolnshire and Humberside; Liverpool Hope University College; Liverpool John Moores University; London School of Economics; Loughborough University; Oxford Brookes University; University of Manchester; University of Portsmouth; University of Sheffield; University of South Hampton; University of Stirling; University of Wales, Bangor; and University of West England (Bristol). The higher education host institution should have links with U.K. police forces and should be appropriate for the proposed research.

Mayor's Graduate Scholarship Program

Award: The Mayor's Graduate Scholarship Program provides partial to full tuition scholarships to City employees seeking graduate degrees. Applicants may apply for more than one award, but may only accept one scholarship.

Eligibility: Award decisions are based on scholastic ability, leadership potential, range of knowledge and experience, and scores on GRE, LSAT, and GMAT, where required. Each individual school determines recipients. Selected applicants must remain full-time city employees while receiving this award.

Academic requirements:

• A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university is required.

Citywide Organizational and Executive Development Programs


The Department of Citywide Administrative Services Executive Development offers two programs: The Leadership Institute and the Management Academy.

Manhattan College School of Continuing and Professional Studies (SCPS)

The Master of Science in Organizational Leadership Program consists of thirty-three (33) credits and it is designed to provide working professionals with the knowledge and skills essential for successful leadership in a variety of sectors.

Graduate Degree Requirements:

• Candidates must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college/university.

Brooklyn Law School Criminal Justice Post Graduate Fellowship Grants

The Criminal Justice Post-Graduate Fellowship Fund was created to promote public service criminal law practice by Brooklyn Law School graduates. This idea is facilitated by awarding loan repayments stipends to graduates who have been practicing public criminal law, (i.e.Legal Aid, Public Defenders, District Attorneys' Offices, Juvenile Justice Agencies, and other government agencies) for five consecutive years.

Applicants must have educational debt of at least \$30,000 at the time of graduating from law school, and significant remaining indebtedness.

Applicants must consent to permit the fellowship committee to use any information by the applicant for publicity purposes. **Note:** The principle criterion for awarding the fellowship is an outstanding commitment to public sector criminal law. Applicants can demonstrate this commitment in numerous ways including professional services, community work, or participation in various bar associations and committees.



John Jay College offers the In-Service Program for retired NYPD uniformed members of the service interested in obtaining the bachelor's degree. Additional Information

Writing a Personal Statement

Personal statements are usually required when requesting consideration for a scholarship or admission to a school. A list of recommendations to include or exclude when writing a personal statement are as follows:

- Be yourself and not the ideal applicant.
- Address the unique features of the school that interest you.
- Provide the reader with insight into what drives you to excel.
- Evaluate experiences, rather than describe them.
- Strive for substance rather than content.
- Avoid repeating information found on the application.
- Do not complain about the circumstances in your life.
- Do not talk about money as a motivator for your academic choice or career goals.
- Do not use technical language or uncommon words.
- Do not remind the school of how reputable or prestigious they are.
- Proofread document carefully for grammatical and structural errors.

The context of a personal statement should be as unique as its writer, within limitations. Before you begin to write, assess your ambitions, successes, limitations and experiences. Ask yourself and answer some of the following questions:

- What details of your life might set you apart?
- What are your career goals?
- How did you learn about the field you will pursue?
- What is distinctive, special, or impressive about you or your life?
- What are some of the compelling reasons you should be selected?

Entrance Examinations

GRE

The Graduate Record Examination (GRE) is not required for admission to all graduate programs or schools. The schools and programs which require GRE scores will provide their own minimum passing scale.

The GRE examination is made up of two parts. The first part, called "The General Test," is designed for general admission into a school and is divided into three sections: verbal, quantitative, and analytical writing. The second part, called "The Subject Test," is designed for entry into a particular program within a school. The total GRE scores are valid for five years.

The GRE examination is given year-round at computer-based test centers in the New York City area. Paper-based exams are available several times a year. Prospective students must register to take the test. Students are advised to use available preparatory programs in advance.

GMAT

The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT) is required by most business schools and Master of Business Administration programs as part of their evaluation process for admission. The GMAT is a computerized examination made available in test centers where prerequisite registration is mandated The GMAT score is valid for 5 years.

The GMAT is made available fifty-two (52) weeks a year. Preparation for the examination will take time and preparatory programs are available.

LSAT

The Law School Admission Test (LSAT) is the most important admission element of any law school. Minimum entrance LSAT scores vary between each school. Most of the examination is comprised of multiple choice questions; however, an essay is included. The test is made available every February, June, October and December.

LSAT preparatory programs are available and recommended.

Eliciting Recommendations

Letters of recommendation are part of the evaluation process for all New York City Police Department scholarships. Admissions offices in colleges and universities, as well as sponsors who provide scholarships, also consider letters of recommendation as a requirement of their selection process. When eliciting a recommendation, select someone who is knowledgeable about your skills and abilities and who will write a favorable letter.

Submitting a well composed reference letter along with your college application could have a positive impact on the admissions committee during the admissions process. Two frequently used types of reference letters are the academic and non-academic reference letters.

Academic letters of recommendation are provided by past or present instructors, professors or a faculty member of a school. Their observations and tangible evidence of work assignments will help elaborate strengths and potential for future academic pursuits.

A non-academic letter of recommendation is usually obtained from an immediate supervisor (past or present), religious leader in a house of worship, elected officials, community activists, or sport coaches. Each may provide first hand, in-depth character witness statements highlighting the prospective students' experiences, skills, and contributions made character traits, and how they relate to the merit of a scholarship or admission into a school. Before approaching anyone for a letter of recommendation, make sure it is someone who can honestly state, from personal experience, the reasons you are qualified for consideration. Willing participants will offer their personal time to compose your letter. The letter of recommendation should read as a personal and honest character assessment by the writer.
